

FIRST AVIATOR STRIKE ENDED

WASHINGTON, July 26.—The postoffice department announced today that the first strike of aviators in history has been settled. It was the result of a misunderstanding according to postal authorities. The six striking aviators who were dismissed yesterday were reinstated today. The two pilots whose dismissal caused the strike were not reinstated.

SCHOOL EXERCISES IN CHURCH, MUST PAY TAXES.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 28.—A school in Glendale a suburb, held its graduation exercises in the First Methodist church, of that city.

Now the church must pay taxes on the property, according to a ruling by Deputy County Counsel Vallee.

The property was placed on the tax roll by the county assessor when he was advised by Mr. Vallee that a section of the state constitution provides for the exemption of church property from taxation only when "used solely and exclusively for religious worship."

This one secular function, according to Mr. Vallee, made the church liable for taxes.

RATTLESNAKES SELL FOR FORTY CENTS A POUND

LOS ANGELES, Calif., July 28.—Jobbers' prices for reptiles, f. o. b. Los Angeles, quote rattlesnakes at 40 cents a pound (more than some cuts of beef); Gila monsters, \$10 a dozen; and lizards, \$3 a hundred.

Needless to state, these creatures are not in demand as food, but, according to Frank Weinberg, who furnished the quotations, additions to collections of reptiles in Europe, where many individuals, as well as menageries, keep them both as fads and as a business.

Like almost everything else, the reptile market suffered because of the war, but, now that it is ended, Mr. Weinberg says, the demand is on the increase.

He and as many small boys as care to engage in the hunt, search the hills and valleys of Southern California for the harmless "things that crawl with legs," but he goes alone into the desert for rattlers and Gila monsters.

He keeps his stock in his backyard, where his wife handles the creatures and helps in their care as fearlessly as does her husband.

A dangerous business? No, according to Mr. Weinberg.

"No more dangerous than driving an automobile," he declared. "Of course, you must be careful in handling the poisonous ones. But most of the reptiles people fear are not dangerous, at all."

He reached into a glass box, thrust his hand under some dry leaves and brought out a large lizard, squirming and trying to bite. He held its head to his lips. It closed its ugly mouth there.

"Perfectly friendly and harmless," said Mr. Weinberg. "See how it kisses me."

A long rattlesnake, which had been sounding a warning, struck, but stopped against the glass side of another box.

"He's a little nervous," said the reptile market man. "He hasn't been handled for some time."

He opened the box, tossed a handkerchief over the snake's head and quickly clasped the creature behind where its ears would have been had it had ears.

"He's a pretty good rattle," said Mr. Weinberg. Worth two dollars, anyway."

Talking of the reptile demand, he said:

"It's like everything else—there is more demand for imported serpents than for home products. In Europe they want American snakes. In America, they want European reptiles."

CUB BEARS WILL BE USED AS FOOTBALL MASCOTS.

LIBBY, Mont., July 28.—The Cornell football team next fall will have as mascots two Montana cub bears, according to present plans of R. H. Bahney, a Massillon, Ohio, steel man, who shot their mother in the hills near here recently. The cubs are strong and husky, and Bahney, a Cornell man himself, has announced his intention to teach them to growl when the Cornell yell is given. He expects to take the cubs east with him later.

HOMEMADE ROOT BEER WILL EXHILIRATE

PHILADELPHIA, July 28.—Root beer made at home may not always be as innocent as its name. Professor Charles H. L. Wall, dean of the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy, cautions the public to look out for the kick. The home brew, he finds, has an alcoholic content of 1.77 percent.

"It will take gallons to produce the familiar dizziness," he said, "but it may provide some exhilaration."

I became interested and began an analysis of some of the beverage. The result was surprising. I found that the alcoholic content was much greater than I had supposed."

"I discovered that after standing five days the beverage contained .53 percent of alcohol; after ten days the percentage jumped to 1.36 and a day or so later had climbed to 1.77. The alcohol came from a natural fermentation."

KING GEORGE WILL VISIT BELGIAN CAPITAL IN SUMMER.

BRUSSELS, July 28.—The Belgians hope to receive in their capital this summer King George of England and King Alfonso of Spain. The English king expects to come immediately after he visits Zebrugge, where he will pay tribute to the Britains' naval efforts on the coast. WILL ORGANIZE U. S. LABOR PARTY SOON

CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 28.—Delegates from ten states representing more than 2,000,000 organized workers will meet here after Labor Day to organize the American Labor Party, it has been announced by local

proponents of the movement. The convention may also decide whether to nominate a national ticket in 1920. Delegates from Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Washington, Oregon, Montana, New York and Ohio are expected to attend the convention.

An effort will be made to insert a plank in the platform calling for the repeal of the federal prohibition amendment, it is said. Other policies to be included in the platform may follow recommendations in resolutions adopted by the American Federation of Labor convention.
