PONDWEED CHOKES DITCHES.

Fennel pondweed is beginning to grow so densely in some of the Oregon irrigation canals that it chokes the current, reducing the flow from 40 to 60 percent. Ditch supervisors and farmer water users asked the Oregon agricultural college station at Corvallis to send a man to determine what the plant is and how to control it. W. F. Lawrence, assistant botanist, has just concluded a preliminary investigation and says that the growth is evidently a pond weed and not, as hitherto reported, a moss, ditch grass or water algae. As many as 50 or 60 plants may grow from a single square foot of bottom, branching many times before reaching the water surface. Professor Lawrence thinks that cutting off the weeds an inch or two below the ground surface with an acme harrow, and throwing them out with pitchforks as they pass under a low bridge, is the best known means of control.

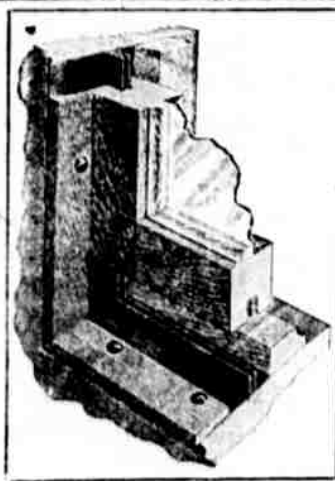
