WILL MAKE COMPLETE STUDY OF TEXTILES IN FAR-OFF AFRICA

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., July 31.—As a member of the Smithsonian African expedition—said to be the largest in scientific scope since the famous Stanley expedition party of half a century ago—Dr. Homer L. Shantz, formerly of Colorado Springs, sailed from New York City recently, to make a special study of African plants and textiles with a view of using them in America.

It is estimated the expedition will cost \$200,000. It will cover over 8,000 miles, extending through the jungles and deserts, by the headwaters of the Nile and over the famous "waterhole country," where there are more wild animals to the square mile than anywhere else on earth, according to zoologists.

The explorers will visit King Solomon's mines. They will pay a call on the Zulus, the only South African race that successfully resisted the whites. They will see the mountains of the Moon, the region of the three foot pygmies, the haunts of the tsetse fly and the original land of the sleeping sickness. They will enter the former negro empire of Uganda, and they will visit the Sultan or Zanzibar on his island.

Ox carts will carry the party over the desert, and horses into the land of poisonous snakes. Black hatch-

men will chop their way thru the primeval jungles, and with native guides the explorers will travel thru the water-hole country.

The nine members of the expedition will head a huge caravan composed of nearly 200 negro porters of various tribes marshaled under a "headman."

BILLS PROVIDE FOR WORKERS

Government Bills on Maximum Working Hours and Minimum Time Rates Up, Before British Parliament.

LONDON, July 31.—To provide adequate living wages and to set a limit of 48 hours as a week's work, is declared to be the purpose of two important bills which are being prepared for action in parliament.

These two measures are understood to be the result of an agreement between representatives of employers, of trade unions and of the minister of labor, acting as a national industrial conference. They are described as "government bills on maximum working hours and minimum time rates."

The wage bill as drawn up provides for an inquiry by a commission to decide what shall be the minimum wages for adults and for young persons, the commission to consider the cost of living. It is also provided that the minimum wage shall be adequate to meet the increased living cost.

The bill intended to make 48 hours constitute a week's work does not apply to domestic servants, seamen on ocean-going vessels, nor to employees in position of trust and confidence. An inquiry is to be held regarding the working conditions of domestic servants and seamen, to determine whether they can be brought within the scope of the bill.

It is stated that if the bills are approved and accepted by the workers affected by them, the trade unions will be asked to aid the government in organizing a national industrial conference to be representative equally of employers and trade unionists.
