CATECHISM OF HATE PRINTED

German Colony in Mexico Prints
Revengeful Article on Day That
the Fatherland Signs the Treaty
of Peace.

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 1.—A "Catechism of Hate" was printed in the Deutsche Zeitung von Mexico, and revenge was threatened in an article accompanying it, on the day when the delegates of the German republic signed the peace treaty at Versailles. The paper, printed in German, is generally believed to voice the opinions of the pan-German, irreconcilable element of the German colony in Mexico. Translations in part of the article follow:

"The day of revenge of the German people is not far off. We shall do good to practice patience until the day of revenge has arrived. Revenge must be coldly consumed. In order to prepare ourselves quietly for it, we need a 'Catechism of Hate'."

The "twelve commandments" of the catechism summarize in brief form many of the protests which have been heard from German sources since the terms of the peace treaty became known. They deny that Germany wanted war, assert that Germany was right in invading Belgium, attack England for the blockade of Germany, aver that Germanys armies were never defeated, and declare that German honor is insulted by making Germans sign admission of their guilt.

In conclusion, the article says: "These twelve commandments will suffice to prepare us mentally for 'The Day' on which the hour of revenge will strike."

Asked if the sentiments expressed in the Deutsche Zeitung's article were those of the entire German colony in Mexico, one of the leaders of the German socialist party in Mexico declared that they were held only by the older and wealthier colonists, who dominated both the paper and the colony, but that a large part of the colony were willing to accept the verdict of the war and give their support to the new German government and to reconstruction policies.

WILL FORCE THEIR DEMANDS UNLESS ACTION IS TAKEN

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 31.—William G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, announced that unless the railroad administration took action by October 1st on the demands of the employees for an increase in wages or a reduction in the cost of living, steps would be taken toward the enforcement of the demands.

Notice to Subscribers

Under authority of the Postmaster General, on account of recent increases in wages to employees, totaling for the State of Oregon upwards of \$225,000.00, certain changes in exchange rates have been approved and made effective July 29, 1919, for the State of Oregon.

The changes in rates apply particularly to residence service, changes having been made in the principal business rates May 1, 1919.

All new business taken on and after July 29th will be at the new rates, and bills to present subscribers for the month of August will be rendered at the new rates.

The increased rates will yield an annual revenue upwards of \$250,000.00, but as the increase in wages is upwards of \$225,000, the net return to the company under the rates now made effective is approximately 2 1/2 per cent on the valuation of its property at \$13,464,000.00, as found by the Public Service Commission.

The new schedule of rates is identical with the one approved by the Postmaster General for the State of Washington, which has been in effect since March 1, 1919. The rates are the same in both states for exchanges that are comparable.

We believe that no proof as to the advanced cost of living and the general high cost prevailing for labor and materials is necessary, and that the telephone using public will accept this increase in rates in the same spirit of fairness and consideration as it has the advances in almost every other necessity in these unusual times.
