

PRIEST ENLISTS AID OF PEOPLE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 1.—Lieutenant Marcel Jousse, a Jesuit priest, is here in the interest of a movement to replace devastated churches in France with temporary shelters for worship.

Lieut. Jousse, served four years in the trenches for France and wears the insignia of the Legion of Honor and the Croix de Guerre. At the request of the French High Commission, he is touring the United States on behalf of the church shelter movement.

The plan, according to Lieutenant Jousse, is to build temporary places of worship for about \$2000 each in places where cathedrals were destroyed by the elements of war.

JEW IN UKRAINE ARE KILLED BY SOLDIERS

LONDON, Aug. 2.—Reports received today from a semi-official Polish source were to the effect that the troops occupying Odessa, under General Gregorieffs had surrounded the Jewish quarters there and began a massacre that lasted three days and nights. Russian soldiers carried out the massacre. Jews of Ukraine and Besarabia proclaimed a mourning period of 14 days.

KOREANS URGING REFORM IN ADMINISTRATION.

TOKIO, Aug. 2.—Several prominent Koreans who have arrived in Tokio are urging the necessity of a radical reform of the administration of Korea, not only by abolishing discrimination between Japanese and Koreans, but also by providing for Korea, representation in the Japanese Diet.

SOCIALISTS ARE IN AUTHORITY

Socialists Take Charge of Governmental Affairs in Vienna When Bela Kun Is Forced to Resign From Leadership.

VIENNA, Aug. 2.—The resignation of Bela Kun, Hungarian Communist dictator, has paved the way for the succession of the Socialist government to authority. Overtures for peace with the Allies were among the first acts of the new government.

On receipt of the news from the front, which created great consternation in Budapest, Kun became pale and with his back to the wall declared, "Very well. If you demand it I must resign—I made the best fight I could."

Bela Kun, who was expected to seek refuge here, was given safe conduct by the Allies.

GREAT BRITAIN DOES NOT DISFAVOR U. S. ACTIVITY

LONDON, Aug. 2.—Politically the British government does not view with disfavor the reported acquisition of German firms by Americans. Asked in the House of Commons if he had any official information that such transactions had taken place, Sir Auckland Geddes, president of the Board of Trade, said that the government had not, but that he was "inclined to regard the action suggested by no means improbable, not only with regard to Americans, but also British firms and firms of allied nations."

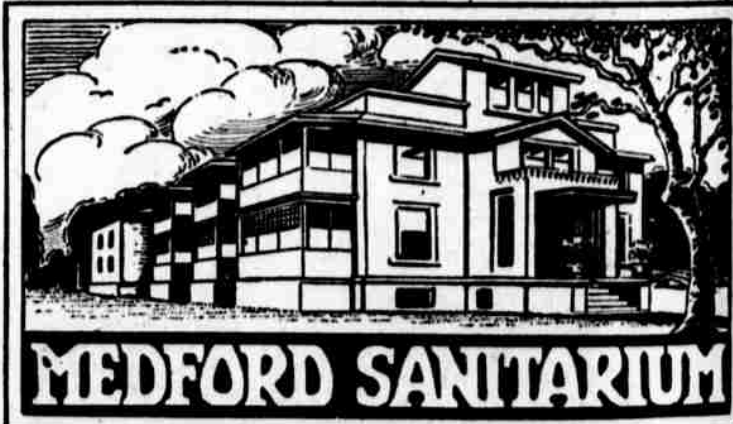
WENZELL'S IN TOWN.
