## DRYDOCK WILL BE OPENED SOON

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 4.—The official opening of the navy drydock at Pearl Harbor, near Honolulu, Hawaii, late this month, will mark the successful completion of one of the most difficult engineering projects ever undertaken by the United States government. The immense dock represents a total investment of more than \$5,000,000, and has been under construction for ten years. Secretary of the Navy Daniels will officiate at the christening of the dock about August 25th.

The dock is completed just in time to add a much needed facility for care of the ships of the Pacific fleet. The first vessel to enter the dock will probably be one of the dreadnoughts of Admiral Rodman's force, possibly the New Mexico. The dock is 1,091 feet in length, 32½ feet deep, 114 feet wide at the bottom and 131 feet wide at the top. It will dock the largest ship of war now afloat or contemplated.

After the sections of the dock had been finished and were being anchored in their places in 1913, the water was pumped out, whereupon the bottom of the dock was forced upward by pressure from the sides, and the engineers and workmen were forced to stand helplessly by and watch the work of hours of labor and millions of dollars of money crushed into a shapeless mass of debris.

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## PIONEER RESIDENT LEAVES RECORD OF DAYS IN MISSOULA

MISSOULA, Mont., Aug. 5.—Shortly before her death, here, Mrs. Elizabeth Countryman Woody, who was one of the six pioneer white women living in Missoula, June 1870, jotted down for the members of her family some of her reminiscences of the early days. These notes have just been made public. One paragraph reads:

"My father, Horace Countryman, carried the news of Custer's massacre, riding day and night from Columbus, Montana, then Stillwater, to Helena, and that is how it was given to the world, the wires being down."

Mrs. Woody was born in Yuba county, California in 1852. As an infant, her parents returned to New

York by way of the Isthmus of Panama, but in 1860 they again headed westward, and crossed the plains, in a cavalcade of 75 wagons, her father serving as Captain of the train. There were but five women. Of this trip, Mrs. Woody wrote:

"It was thru the mercy of God, and my father's bravery, coolness and good judgment, that we reached our destination in safety. The Indians were bad and the train passed thru many narrow escapes. Frequently we saw smoldering heaps of what had been less fortunate trains than ours."

## COUNTER PROPOSALS GIVEN.

PARIS, Aug. 5.—Dr. Karl Renner, Austrian Chancellor, announced that the Austrian counter proposals to the peace terms would be handed over tomorrow, within the prescribed time.

## ROUMANIAN TROOPS PLUNDER IN SUBURBS

PARIS, Aug. 5.—Telegrams from American officers at Budapest state that the Rumanian troops upon entering Budapest started plundering in suburbs. Fifteen or twenty civilians were killed by the Rumanians during the day. The Rumanians demanded hostages threatening to kill five hostages for each Rumanian soldier that was killed in Budapest. Some of the new Hungarian ministers were arrested by the local police. Mounted machine guns were demobilized.
