WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 4 .-The official opening of the navy drydock at Pearl Harbor, near Honolulu, Hawaii, late this month, will mark the successful completion of one of the most difficult engineering projects ever undertaken by the United States government. The immense dock represents a total investhas been under construction for ten years. Secretary of the Navy Daniels will officiate at the christening of the dock about August 25th.

The dock is completed just in time to add a much needed facility for care of the ships of the Pacific fleet. The first vessel to enter the dock will probably be one of the dreadnoughts Admiral Rodman's force, possibly the New Mexico. The dock is 1,001 feet in length, 321/2 feet deep, 114 feet wide at the bottom and 131 feet wide at the top. It will dock the largest ship of war now affoat or con-
