## SPIRIT WORSHIP FATAL TO THREE

Superstitious Negroes in Cuba Kill Little Children During Their Practice of Canabalistic Religious Ceremonies.

HAVANA, Cuba, Aug. 7.—With the recent sudden outbreak of cannibalistic practices of Voodoo worshippers, which have resulted in the deaths of at least three innocent children and a half dozen of the Voodoos, the latter of the application of "lynch" law for the first time in this country's history, fathers and mothers are living in constant fear that their little ones may be spirited away by the superstitious negroes to be offered up in sacrifice to "Chango," the god of the "Brujos," as they are called in the Castilian language.

The Voodoos are divided in various sects, each with its separate god. The latter include "Babagweye," god of sickness; "Elecu," god of injury; "Olorrn," god of misery, and "Chango," the terrible god, to whom human sacrifices are made.

"Chango," according to the Voodoo belief, was the son of Olorrn and Anaragua. He was slain by Elecu, the "god of injury," and ascended into Heaven from a Ceiba, or god-tree, in the month of May. It is in the month of May therefore, that the "Brujos" observe their Holy week when Chango is expected to make a weekly visit to the earth, descending by the Ceiba, his sacred tree, always on Monday.

The followers of Elecu do not directly offer human sacrifices, although their healers sacrifice the lives of some patients, by giving them poisonous concoctions, supposedly a mysterious cure for some ailment, in order to restore to health some other patient, Elecu, being the "God of Injury," his followers believe that good can come to one person only thru injury to another.

Voodooism is not practiced by the negroes alone. Many white persons also are said to secretly take part in their religious meetings and accusations have been heard in various quarters of the difficulties encountered by officers seeking to break up their temples of the obstacles placed in their way by persons of influence. An active campaign by the authorities in Havana and other parts of the island have resulted in the capture of numerous "Brujos" and the seizure of many curious and weird objects used by them.

### PLAN TO MAN FLEET WITH WESTERN MEN

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.—"Man the Pacific fleet with Western Men" will be the slogan of the intensive recruiting campaign to be launched at every port visited by the fleet upon its arrival on this coast.

Men will be enlisted at war time pay for two, three or four year terms. The shorter term is expected to be especially attractive to young boys just completing their schooling. To these and all who enlist will be given opportunity, it has been announced to choose the ship which they wish to join. Cruises to many points in the Pacific at frequent intervals also is expected to lure many.

Manning the ships with western men also, it was said, will tend to keep individual ships permanently stationed in Western waters, as the desire of the men and officers will be to have their ships based at home ports.

In this connection some navy men look to see some ships almost completely manned by officers and crew from an individual city or district at which it would have its base. In the east many times ships have been transferred from one base to another because a preponderance of crew and officers lived at a certain port or base.

## AMERICAN PLAN IS NOT PRESSED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—Secretary of State Robert Lansing, one of the five delegates from the United States to the Peace Conference in Paris, told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that the American plan for the League of Nations "was not pressed" at Versailles.

He likewise said that it had never been presented to the full peace conference. Secretary Lansing declared that he did not know whether there was a copy of the American draft in existence although he thought that the President might have one.

Discussing Shantung, Secretary Lansing said that the Lansing-Ishih agreement had been made to obtain the reaffirmation by Japan of the open-door policy in China. He said it was entered into by the American government without the knowledge of the secret treaty between Japan and the Allies for the transfer of German concessions in Shantung to Japan.

## WILL PURCHASE FOREIGN BONDS

Government in Vienna Will Buy Precious Metals From Private Individuals to Purchase Needed Raw Materials.

VIENNA, Aug. 7.—The government has decreed that it will take over all gold, silver, jewelry, foreign bonds and forests which are in the possession of private individuals, who will receive compensation for them. One of the government's objects is to obtain funds to purchase coal and raw materials in order to provide work for the people, incidentally to buy foodstuffs, without which the starvation conditions of last winter will be horribly accentuated this fall.

It is predicted that unless the Allies occupy Budapest and end the present communist regime the country's crops will be wasted and the people will starve in the coming winter.

The first effect of a kind of blockade established by a force of American soldiers along the Austrian frontier of Hungary will be to prevent money, or materials which represent money from flowing out of the country, for it is known that the communists are sending money abroad for propaganda purposes.

The Americans are experiencing great difficulties in controlling an immense amount of contraband traffic that has sprung up in small border towns like Bruck, through which the communists are smuggling out money and Hungarians who fled to Vienna are trying to bring out their hoarded treasures and bonds. There is said to exist a special smuggling service carried out by airplanes by means of which hundreds of millions of crowns have been conveyed out of the country.

### EDUCATION COSTS INCREASE RAPIDLY IN QUAKER TOWN

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 7.—The cost of public education here increased \$2.52 for each pupil last year.

In the previous five years, the cost of public education increased only \$1.08 for each pupil.

Philadelphia last year paid \$40.15 for the instruction of each of its 235,258 pupils in the public schools. In 1917 the cost was only \$37.63 a pupil.

In the last year there were from thirty-six to forty-four pupils to each teacher.

In its total amount of expenditures for education the Philadelphia Board spends more, with the exception of New York and Chicago, than any other city in the nation. New York spends about \$42,000,000 annually in its schools and Chicago spends about \$17,000,000. Philadelphia last year spent \$11,800,787.

## COST OF FLEET IS ENORMOUS

MUCH PUBLICITY GIVEN FLEET.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 7.—Much publicity will be given the Pacific fleet at every port visited and the quantity and prominence of news concerning it will total volumes.

Many seaport newspapers are preparing special editions to welcome the fleet's men and officers.

Average Cost of Maintaining Vessels of the Pacific Fleet Is Given to Public Through Publication in Navy Year Book.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 7.—The economic value of the Pacific fleet to the west is indicated by the average cost of maintaining warships as shown in the United States Navy year book. The figures were for 1915, but it was said these costs have increased many percent perhaps more than doubled since that time.

The following includes pay for officers and men, repairs to hull and machinery and other costs for a year:  
Battleships, \$829,074.83; Armored cruiser, \$663,992.62; Cruiser, first-class, \$512,729.67; Cruiser, third-class, \$290,351.59; Destroyer, \$125,061.78; Monitor, \$193,556.95; Submarine, \$37,394.70; Transport, \$252,928.97; Gunboat, \$126,140.86; Supply ship, \$202,768.60; Hospital ship, \$202,271.40; Torpedo ship tender, \$187,775.996; Fuel ship \$116,093.21.

Since the foregoing table was published pay for sailors, dock and skilled labor of navy plants has increased as has every other item going into maintenance of a ship.

There will be approximately 200 vessels in the new Pacific fleet. All will not be in the service and the battleships will number only about fifteen at all times, but multiplication of types of craft by the average cost of maintenance in 1915 yields an impressive total. Most of this cost will be expended in Pacific states.

### NEW INDUSTRY SPRINGS UP.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Aug. 6.—Packing of fresh shrimps is a new industry begun by two companies at Petersburg, Alaska. The shrimp come from Thomas bay and after two cookings are placed in five-pound cans, given a sanitary sealing without salt, water or other material being added. The product is shipped on ice.
