

PACIFIC FLEET IS OUTCOME OF LONG CAMPAIGN

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 8.—Division of the United States navy and dispatch to this coast of the Pacific fleet marks the end of a long campaign that has been waged by officials and citizens of Pacific states for what they termed "adequate naval protection."

The Pacific coast attitude had been that great possibility of attack menaced the Pacific states unless the nation sent westward a large fleet.

Active campaigning for a big Pacific naval force began with the close of the Spanish American war. It was urged that the Philippines and other Pacific islands possessed by the United States should be protected, governors, congressional representatives and other officials made strong representations in the months following that war for increased naval strength on the Pacific.

After the building of the Panama canal many men in public life asserted that, in case of attack from the Pacific and destruction of the canal the largest part of the country's naval force would be kept away from the Pacific for a long period. During which the Pacific states would be open to invasion.

Public men and newspapers of the Pacific Coast were practically a unit for naval expansion and ultimate stationing of a large force here. Plans for

curtailing naval expansion with the signing of the armistice in some quarters were countered by many insistent demands from this coast that the full building program be adhered to.

The announcement of Secretary Daniels that the navy was to be divided and approximately 200 ships stationed in the Pacific was hailed with delight.

ORDER INSTITUTING INVESTIGATION ISSUED

Whereas at 12 o'clock midnight on the thirty-first day of July 1919, possession, control and supervision of the facilities and property of The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company was assumed by the United States Government pursuant to a joint resolution of the Sixty-fifth Congress, and by proclamation dated July 22, 1918, the President of the United States of America directed that the supervision, possession, control and operation of the properties should be exercised by and through the Postmaster General, Albert S. Burleson; and

Whereas by Act of Congress signed by the President on July 11, 1919, the possession, control and supervision of the facilities and property of The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company were released from Federal control and thereupon became subject to the jurisdiction of this commission under the Public Utility Act on and after midnight of July 31, 1919, which said Act further provides that certain toll and exchange telephone rates fixed by the Postmaster General should continue in force for a period not to exceed four months from and after July 30, 1919 unless sooner modified or changed by the proper State Regulatory bodies; and

and Telegraph Company has filed with the Public Service Commission of Oregon a schedule of rates, designated P. S. C. Or. No. 4 purporting to have been approved by the Postmaster General and covering the local telephone exchange service throughout the State of Oregon, which said rates are now being collected, and are an increase in certain particulars and instances over the rates fixed by this Commission in its Order No. 439 dated May 1, 1919; and

Whereas this Commission believes that sufficient grounds exist to warrant hearing being held as to the legality and reasonableness of the rates contained in said schedule P. S. C. Or. No. 4.

Now, therefore, It is hereby ordered that an investigation be and hereby is instituted on the Commission's own motion into the legality and reasonableness of all the rates and charges, rules and regulations of The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company for exchange telephone service rendered entirely within the State of Oregon, and that a hearing in this matter be had before the Public Service Commission of Oregon in its offices at 252 Court House, Portland, Oregon, on Wednesday the 27th day of August, 1919, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m., at which time and place all interested parties may appear and be heard.

BIG BRAINS WORK ON LIVING COSTS

Federal Trade Commission Reveals New Light on Subject—President Will Address Congress Tomorrow on High Prices.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 7.—Although prices on practically all important food show a substantial increase during the last year, stocks of food held in storage on June 1st were approximately 20 per cent greater than a year ago, according to the report made by the Federal Trade Commission.

Government stocks are excluded from the comparison.

"This apparently means," says the report, "that stocks are being withheld speculative for the world demand which is not now here, but is expected when hunger impels the strikers to secure higher wages with which to pay higher prices."

Glenn Plumb, a Chicago lawyer, representing the Railroad Brotherhood, said today that they have information showing that there had been "systematic plundering of virtually all public transportation highways in the country." The source of the information led from Wall street and the Morgan and Rockefeller banking houses.

Indications are that President Wilson's address to Congress tomorrow will be confined entirely to matters pertaining directly to the high cost of living. Secretary Tumulty said that it was unlikely that the President would take up at this time further questions concerning railroad wages.

IRISH NEWSBOY WINS CROIX DE GUERRE

DES MOINES, Aug. 8.—Pat Ryan, a newsboy, has returned to his old corner after an absence of many months overseas. He wears the Croix de Guerre.
