westerly to Eighth street and Jeff-

to eighth street, including intersec-
tions.

Said proposed improvement to be
made in accordance with the plans
and specifications of the City Engi-

Ordinance No. 468 adopted on the
4th day of August 1919, and by the
mayor approved on the 5th day of

successful bidder upon failure to
enter into contract and bond for the
faithful completion of the improve-
ment in accordance with the plans
and specifications. The City of Klamath
Falls reserving the right to reject
any and all proposals for making
said improvement.

for making the proposed improve-
ment is hereby made contingent up-
on the sale of the bonds authorized
to provide funds for making said
improvement.

LEADING JEWS WILL CONFER

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—Several
score of leading Jews from all parts
of the country will meet here next
Sunday, August 10th, at the invita-
tion of Felix M. Warburg, the Wall
street banker and chairman of the
joint distribution committee of the
Jewish relief funds, to consider the
present extreme crisis of Jewry
abroad, as outlined by recently re-
turned investigators, and to deter-
mine upon a definite, unified pro-
gram in which all sections of Amer-
ican Jewry shall join to save the
race in Europe from destruction.
The conference will extend over a
period of two or three days, with
sessions in the morning, afternoon
and evening.

Invitations have gone to all mem-
bers of the joint distribution com-
mittee and to many other prominent
men who are interested in the work
of this organization and of the
American Jewish relief committee,
the funds of which are turned over
to the joint distribution committee.
Among those who have been asked
by Mr. Warburg to attend are Louis
Marshall, Jacob Schiff, Felix M. War-
burg, Nathan Strauss and Henry
Morganthau, all of New York city.

AVIATORS WILL AID ARMY RECRUITING

CAMP LEWIS, Wash., Aug. 8.—
Aviators sent to Camp Lewis from
Washington, D. C., have started on
a series of trips throughout the
Northwest to stimulate and encour-
age recruiting. Four of them, using
two Curtiss J-N-4-D planes, with 90-
h. p. engines, can average 70 miles
an hour through the blue, at alti-
tudes anywhere up to 12,000 feet.

The flyers are all exceptionally en-
thusiastic over the planes for "the
new army," and are anticipating ex-
cellent results on their recruiting
expeditions. They will give any
man who enlists a ride in one of the
planes if he so desires, thus giving
him a "fast take-off and lofty aims"
at the outset of his army life.

A two-unit hangar, 30x100 feet,
has been constructed to house the
planes while in camp, just south of
the camp recruiting office, 13th and
Montana streets. Almost any part
of the big parade ground affords a
good landing place, so soldiers in
the cantonment are afforded daily ex-
hibitions of all kinds of plain and
fancy flying. The ships cavort like
playful swallows before leaving and
after returning home—and they add
numerous stunts the swallows never
thought of.

277 CITIES, TOWNS AND VILLAGES HAVE DEFUNCT
MUNICIPAL LIGHTING PLANTS

Read the 1919 report of the Merchant's Association of New York:

"The 277 cities, towns and villages named below comprise but a part of
those which after a trial of municipal ownership and operation of electric
lighting plants, have ceased, in whole or in part, to operate the plants.
In practically all these cases municipal operation was undertaken in the
belief that the community would obtain electric service at materially less
cost than if obtained from private companies. Experience demonstrates
that this belief was mistaken. Most of the municipalities sold or scrapped
their plants at a heavy sacrifice, and thereafter obtained from private
companies service at materially less cost."

WILL SEND COMMISSIONER TO ALL MARKETS OF WORLD.

LONDON, Aug. 9.—The Federa-
tion of British industries which is
composed of more than 900 of Brit-
ain's largest manufacturers and as-
sociations of manufacturers has for-
mulated plans for an overseas organi-
zation which contemplates the ap-
pointment in every market of the
world of a commissioner to be assist-
ed where advisable by expert advis-
ors.

For its purpose the federation has

divided the world into twenty-one
areas and already has appointed a
commissioner for some of them. The
purpose of the federation is to ex-
plore the possibilities of all markets
and to further British trade by pro-
viding information for British manu-
facturers.

MODERN DRESS STYLES ARE ATTACKED BY ARCHBISHOP.

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 9.—Modern
styles of dress and coiffure were the
subject of much criticism recently by

Doctor Jose Moray del Rio, Arch-
bishop of Mexico, who read an open
letter to his parishioners declaiming
against extremes in toilet and asking
mothers to refrain from appearing in
exaggerated costumes and from al-
lowing their children to do so. The
Archbishop termed modern styles "an
advance toward paganism" and re-
commended that, in church at least,
the women return to the use of the
veil and mantilla.
