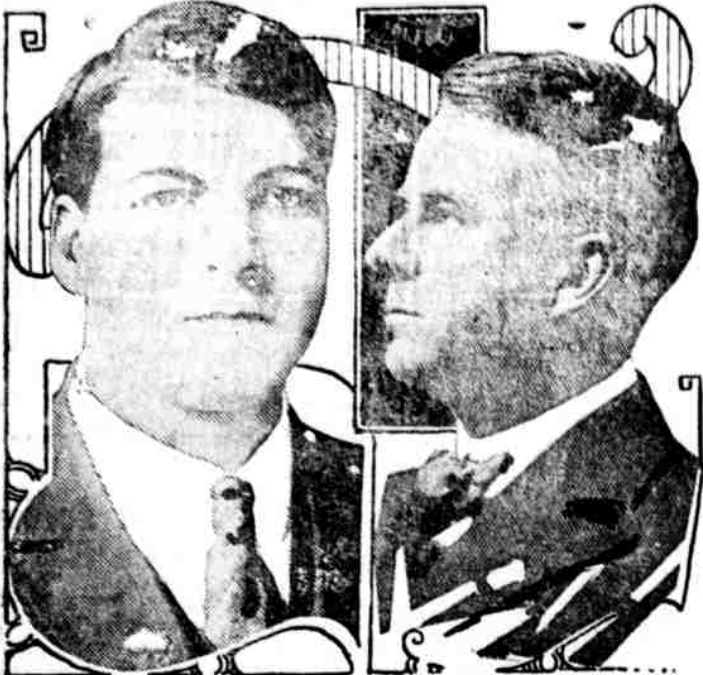

Daddies of the Packer Bill



Congressman Sydney Anderson, Minnesota, and Senator W. S. Kenyon, Iowa, joint "fathers" of the packer bill, approved by the Federal Trade Commission, and which is regarded as the fruit of the commission's meat and live stock investigations. The bill provides for the government licensing of packing plants, excepting farmers' cooperative plants and those doing business of under \$500,000 a year. Failure to obey the provisions of the license would result in the government taking over the offending packing plant. Under the provisions of the bill the packers must give up control of the refrigerator cars, retire from ownership of fruit, vegetable and fish canneries, from the grocery business, and from active control of the stockyards. They would be limited solely to butchering and preparing meat and its by-products. The Secretary of Agriculture is designated as the administrative officer under the license plan.

At the Theatres

Beginning today at the Star Theatre the play is playing one of the strongest photoplays of recent date. This is the A. H. Woods production of "The Guilty Man," directed by Irvin V. Thorne, under the supervision of Thomas H. Ince. The cast includes beautiful Gloria Hope, Vivian Reed, Charles French, Hal Cooley, John Stepping, and Clayward Mack.

The story is one of gripping intensity, dealing with the life of a Parisian and her illegitimate daughter, who, murdering her step-mother, is prosecuted for the state by her own father, who learning the identity of the beautiful girl he is going to condemn to death, begs for her forgiveness as well as that of her mother. Ruth Helen Davis and Charles Klein are the authors of the production, which enjoyed a long and successful run in a Broadway stage recently.

The impersonation of a dead man by one who would be accused of his murder if the death were known, is the novel situation that forms the basis of "The Fire Flinders." Rupert Julian's latest Universal picture, which will be shown today at the Liberty Theatre.

Julian plays both the dead man and the impostor. The picture is based on a Saturday Evening Post story of the same name by William J. Neidig.

Richard Olwell, a publisher who is about to desert his wife for another woman, taking \$200,000 of his wife's money, is killed by accident, but in such a manner that Richard Hutton, a convict just released from prison, will be under suspicion of killing him. Realizing this, and to save himself and his fellow-convict, Chris Cottrell, from the electric chair, Hutton impersonates the dead man, whom he closely resembles. He is aided in this by the fact that he and Olwell both wore beards and Olwell had announced his intention of removing his.

The emotional appeal of the story lies in Hutton's relations with Olwell's wife, and another element of suspense lies in the disappearance of the \$200,000. The play works up to a tremendous climax.

ATHLETE TELLS HOW TO KEEP IN CONDITION

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Aug. 12.—"Eat plain wholesome food; sleep at least eight hours every night; don't use tobacco in any form, and take some form of physical exercise every day, being careful not to over exert yourself at the start." Such is the receipt for 100 percent physical condition outlined by John W. Kyle, Indiana University football player, who recently was described as 100 percent perfect, physically in an army medical examination.

To show he believes in his own receipt, Kyle asserts he never has smoked a cigarette. For his daily exercise this summer he is swinging a sledge hammer in a Gary steel mill. He weighs 190 pounds and is five feet, eleven inches in height.

NEARLY 120,000 MEN IN MEXICAN ARMY

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 11.—The strength of the Mexican army is placed at 17,725 officers and 119,393 men in an article recently published by Captain Francisco Lazcano, who is referred to by the newspapers here as being in a position to speak with accuracy. According to his figures, which are based on reports for the month of April, there are two generals of division, eleven generals of brigade, forty-eight brigadiers and 843 jefes (chiefs) whose ranks have been recognized by the government as permanent. There are, however, 16,461 generals, chiefs and subordinate officers who are serving temporarily.

APRICOTS CLIMB TO DIZZY HEIGHT

Southern California Apricots Are Worth One Hundred Dollars a Ton, or Five Cents Per Pound at This Time.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 12.—One hundred dollars a ton—five cents a pound. That is the price to which apricots in Southern California have climbed to this season. As a result, the crop in this section of the state will return to growers more than \$75,000,000. Never before in the history of the industry has the crop reached these prices.

Layers of fruits for canning from practically every large country in the world, are here offering almost any price for the fruit on the trees, and the demand exceeds the supply to such an extent that unless buyers' wives here buy at once, there will be no fruit left for home canning purposes.

The rapid rise in the market value of the fruit is due to the post-war demand of foreign nations, according to the growers. Prior to the war, apricots sold in the Los Angeles market at approximately \$20 a ton for the highest grade fruit. Hundreds of tons of fruit were unsold and growers suffered heavy losses.

FAMOUS INVENTOR ENJOYS 53RD ANNIVERSARY TODAY

Simon Lake, who is attracting attention with his invention of a submarine that permits you to go around the ocean bed in your street clothes, is a naval architect and a mechanical engineer now residing in Milford, Conn., with his manufacturing headquarters at Bridgeport. Lake was born at Pleasantville, N. J., fifty-three years ago, and received his education principally at Franklin Institute, Philadelphia. He is claimant for the title of first inventor of the even-keel type of submarine, and in 1897, with the Argonaut, first operated a submarine in the open sea. His inventive genius has been profusely in connection with machines for locating and recovering sunken vessels and their cargoes, and for carrying on submarine industries. The United States government and European nations have utilized his inventions, and he has been honored with election to membership in leading engineering and scientific bodies of America and Europe.
