ROAD SUFFERS BIG DEFICIT

BOULDER, Colo., Aug. 12.—The "Switzerland Trail of America" has reached its last milestone. By order of the state public utilities commission, the Denver, Boulder and Western railway company, whose tracks traverse some of the most impressive mountain districts in the United States, will be permitted to discontinue service at midnight, September 15, 1919.

Despite recently increased rates, the road has suffered a deficit of \$8067 in 1918 and a deficit of \$6667 during the first five months of the current year. Rapid development of motor truck transportation and automobile tours have worked against the success of the enterprise.

From the beginning of the history of the road and that of its predecessors, failure has hovered over the project. Cloudbursts which washed out the road bed, misplaced calculations regarding the volumes of shipments and irresistible competition are factors in its doom. The railroad has 46 miles of track and employs 35 men.
