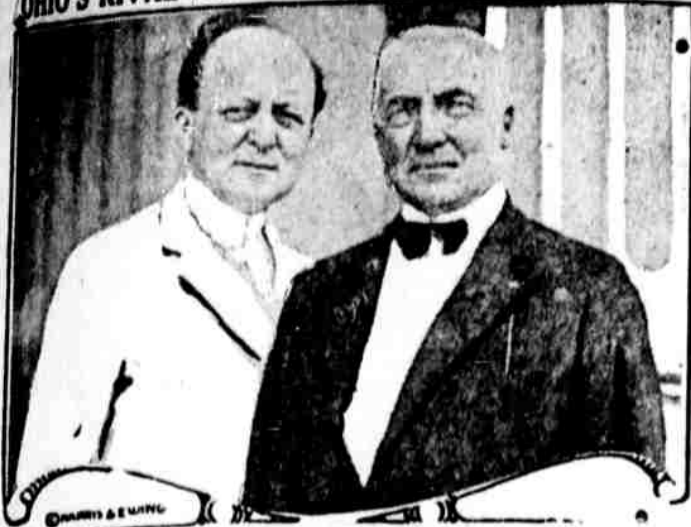


OHIO'S RIVAL FAVORITE SONS POSE TOGETHER

FINAL ARGUMENTS IN FORD LIBEL SUIT ENDED TODAY.

MOUNT CLEMENS, Aug. 13.—Final arguments in the Henry Ford—Chicago Tribune libel suit ended today.

Attorney Stevenson, for the Chicago Tribune, pointed out to the jury the evidences of ignorance that Ford showed on the witness stand. He said that Ford did not know what the fundamentals of government were and that he did not care. "I was never so shocked in my life—it was pitiful," said the attorney.
