**HORSE MARINES COME INTO OWN**

**SANTA BARBARA, Aug. 15.**—"Horse Marines"—those mounted seamen of fabled fame—are actually coming into being, when the Pacific fleet anchors in Santa Barbara Channel, for a six day stay beginning Aug. 18.

At the beach along the Esplanade del Mar, a hundred or more horses will be provided with which the sailormen can entertain themselves. All sorts of races will be arranged from the old time "backamore" contest which dates back to the Spanish period of California's occupation to the more modern rough-riding of Western pioneer days. Prizes will be awarded to the jockies who excel at horsemanship.

Santa Barbara is to take special cognizance of the petty officers. Heretofore it is said, the "non-coms" have been somewhat overlooked, but in the Mission City a series of banquets are to be given for their entertainment.

**SITE SELECTED FOR COLONY.**

**MEXICO CITY, Aug. 16.**—Las Palmas, Lower California, has been selected as the site of the first colony to be established by repatriated Mexicans, five thousand of whom are said by the newspaper El Democrata to have returned to Mexico from the United States within the past few months. "The 277 cities, towns and villages named below comprise but a part of those which after a trial of municipal ownership and operation of electric lighting plants, have ceased, in whole or in part, to operate the plants. In practically all these cases municipal operation was undertaken in the belief that the community would obtain electric service at materially less cost than if obtained from private companies. Experience demonstrates that this belief was mistaken. Most of the municipalities sold or scrapped their plants at a heavy sacrifice, and thereafter obtained from private companies service at materially less cost."
