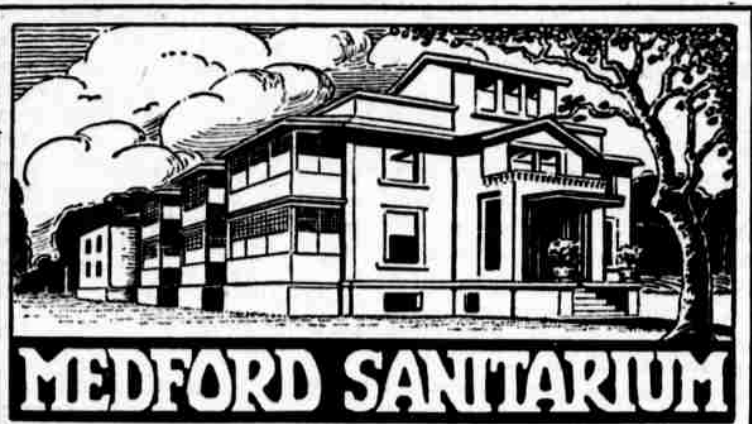

GERMANY'S FATE ACCOUNTED FOR

University Professor Explains Why Entire World Rose Up in Arms Against Prussia, Instead of England.

BERLIN, Aug. 23.—"The reason why the whole world rose up against Prussia and Germany and not against England is plain to everyone who has observed the Prussian policy in Poland and the Prussian administration in Alsace," asserts Professor F. W. Forester, of the University of Munich, writing in the Tageblatt. "England practiced much might to be sure, but it has also given the world much freedom and justice," he added. "She succeeded in reconciling the Boers whereas we were unable in forty years to rec-in the sympathies of the Alsations who are German to the core. That speaks volumes." "The isolation of Germany from Hague conferences is irrefutable proof in dominant circles that Germany is possessed of different mentality than the rest of the world." He charges Germany with having erred in the exchange of the Versailles notes on the question of guilt and states that many one-sided accusations might have been combated more effectively if Germany had not again endeavored to defend untenable positions with rank sophistries.

ROADS OF WESTERN OREGON REPORTED IN GOOD CONDITION

Information compiled by the United States forest service indicates that the roads of Western Oregon are in good condition, considering the unprecedented travel over them that has occurred this summer. The data is furnished by field men of the forest service, and covers only the roads in or near the national forests of Western Oregon.

Columbia River Highway—Closed to auto travel at the Hood River County-Multnomah County line. Cars are allowed to pass through between the hours of 12 m. and 1 p. m. and 6 p. m. and 7 a. m.; also Sundays. The stretch between the county line and Cascade Locks is to be paved. When this paving is finished, cars can get to Cascade Locks, ferry to the Washington side, go up the North Bank road to White Salmon, and then ferry to Hood River, in Oregon.

Cottage Grove-Diston—Open and in good condition between Cottage Grove and the Pusston ranch. Closed for autos between this point and Bohemia. No detours possible. Wagons can get over this road.

Pacific Highway—Open and in excellent condition, except where construction work is now in progress between Gold Hill and Medford.

Three Rivers—Open between Willamette and Tillamook. Very rough for six miles through the Grande Ronde Indian reservation; here for several days after rain it is practically impassable. Construction work between Dolph and H-bro makes detour down the Little Nestucca necessary.

Bandon-Gold Beach—Open and passable for light cars entire length.

McKenzie Highway—Open and in good condition, Eugene to Blue River; fair condition Blue River thru McKenzie Pass to Sisters.

Willamette—Open for machines between Eugene and Redden. Passable for wagons across summit.

Santiam Wagon Road—Open and in fair condition from Foster to summit of Cascade. Machines cross the pass into Eastern Oregon by this route.

Barlow—Open between Sandy and Warrenton. In good condition Sandy to Twin Bridges; poor, Twin Bridges to Clear Creek; fair Clear Creek to Wapinitia.

Eugene-Florence—Open and in permanent summer condition for the entire route.

Medford-Klamath Falls—Open and in fair condition entire length; numerous rough places, due to heavy traffic.

Anna Creek—Open and in generally good condition.

Crescent City-Brookings—Open and in fair condition entire length. Has some rough places.

Grants Pass-Crescent City—Open and in fair condition. Rough on Oregon mountain. Quite rough between Oregon Mountain and Wildo. California side in good condition.

Waldport-Alesea—Open entire route and passable. The road south from Waldport by Yahats and Cape Perpetua to Ten Mile Creek is open and in fair summer condition.

Riddle-Tiller—Open and in good condition.
