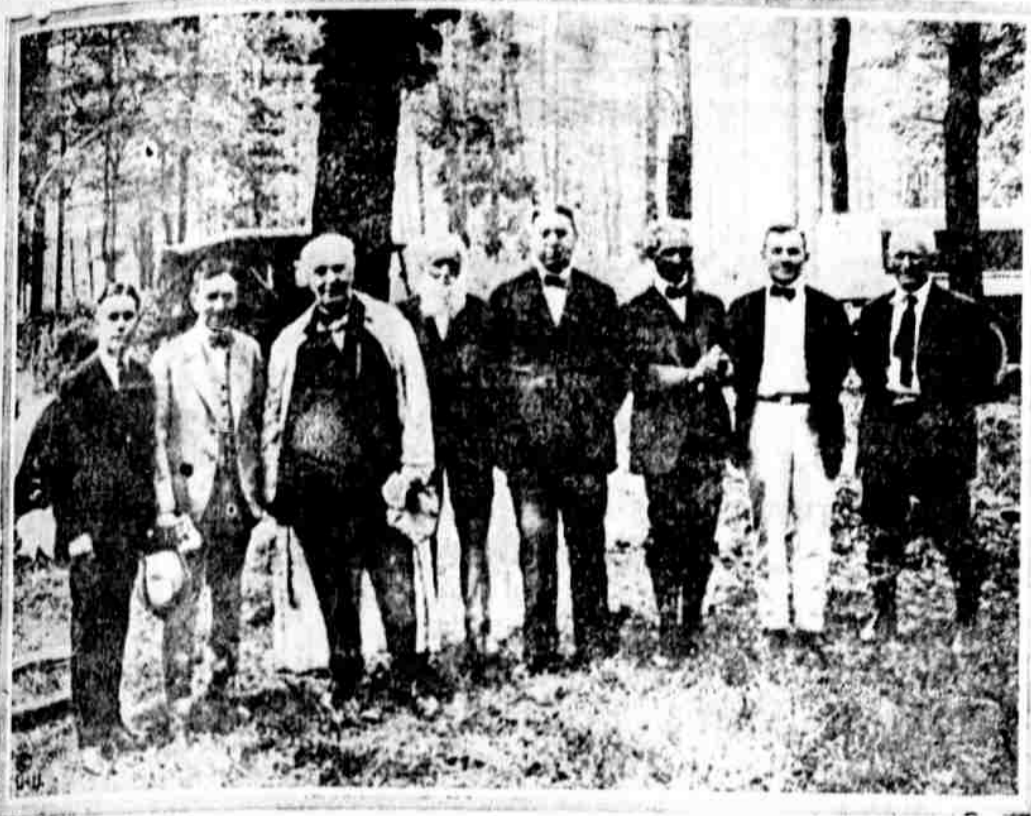


Railway Labor Leaders Asking for Government Ownership

His case was taken under consideration by the court, as were the cases of J. F. Maguire and H. J. Sheets. The latter admitted that the charge against him was true, and that his premises were just as stated by the chief. He claimed, however, that it was due to the failure at times of the garbage man to remove the material, as well as to litter deposited by reason of repairs that were being made by the tenant upstairs. Mr. Maguire said that the material in the rear of his building was there because of alterations that were being made preparatory to the changing of the building from an office into a shoe store. He had no extenuating excuses to offer, and added that he was glad to see the chief take matters in hand, and reduce the hazards.

All the other cases were continued until this afternoon and Monday and Tuesday.
