## "LITTLE WHITE GIRL" PLACED IN NATIONAL GALLERY IN LONDON

LONDON, Aug. 22.—One of Whistler's most famous paintings, the "Little White Girl," is now on view in the National gallery to which it was presented together with two other Whistler paintings, "Cremorne Lights" and the "Fire Wheel."  
"The Little White Girl" was painted in 1864 and exhibited at the Royal Academy in 1865 where it created a sensation and aroused much hostile criticism. One critic regretted that Whistler should make the "most bizarre of bipeds" out of the women he painted, and an American critic described it as a "powerful woman with red hair and a vacant stare in her eyes."

Among the few who appreciated its charm was Swinburne who after seeing it wrote the poem, "Before the Mirror." The picture, for which the model "Jo" sat, shows a girl in a simple white gown leaning against the mantle, her face reflected in the mirror.

"Cremorne Lights" is a nocturne in blue and silver, a twilight scene with only two tones, the sky and the water slightly lighter in color, with the ghosts of buildings and the reflections of the lights of the old Cremorne Gardens.

"The Fire Wheel" is a picture of a fireworks display, a nocturne in black and gold.

## DANIELS MAKES TOUR OF ISLAND

Secretary of Navy, Accompanied by Several Officers of the Pacific Fleet, Sees All Phases of Hawaiian Life.

HONOLULU, T. H., Aug. 22.—Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels, who came to Hawaii for the dedication of the great Pearl Harbor naval drydock and officers of the battleship New York and destroyers Chaney, Dent, Philip and Waters, which brought him here from California, today saw all phases of Hawaiian life and industry in an automobile ride "around the island" of Oahu, a 90 mile drive famous the world over.

From the modern skyscrapers of Honolulu, the visitors in a few hours were whisked to tiny villages where natives still live in grass huts, used in Hawaii for 1500 years; they passed the royal mausoleum where lie the bones of many of Hawaii's native rulers; they drove through tens of thousands of acres of growing sugar cane and through enormous pineapple plantations.

Leaving Honolulu, the motor cars for six miles climbed up Nuuanu valley, which terminates abruptly at the Pali in a narrow gash with towering mountains on either side with a sheer drop of 1200 feet to the pineapple fields on the plains. A wonderful panorama of land and sea closed without an instant's warning.

The greatest event in Hawaiian history occurred in the Pali. When Kamehameha the Great invaded Oahu from his own realm, Hawaii, in 1795 his warriors engaged the army of the king of Oahu in Nuuanu valley. After a desperate encounter the Oahuans fled in a wild rout up the valley, the Hawaiians closely pursuing. Rather than surrender, thousands of Oahuans plunged over the Pali to instant death. A bronze tablet at the Pali, tell the story of Kamehameha's victory, which resulted in the unification of the islands of Hawaii and the foundation of the Kamehameha dynasty, a succession of kings and queens ruling the group until Queen Liliuokalani was deposed in 1893, when a republic was established. Annexation to the United States followed in 1898.

The trip took the party to Lale, the Mormon settlement, where a magnificent new temple was recently completed. Here some 500 native converts to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints work a big sugar plantation and railroad, the property of the church. A visit was paid to Schottfield Barracks, the largest military reservation in Hawaii where accommodations are available for 30,000 troops.
