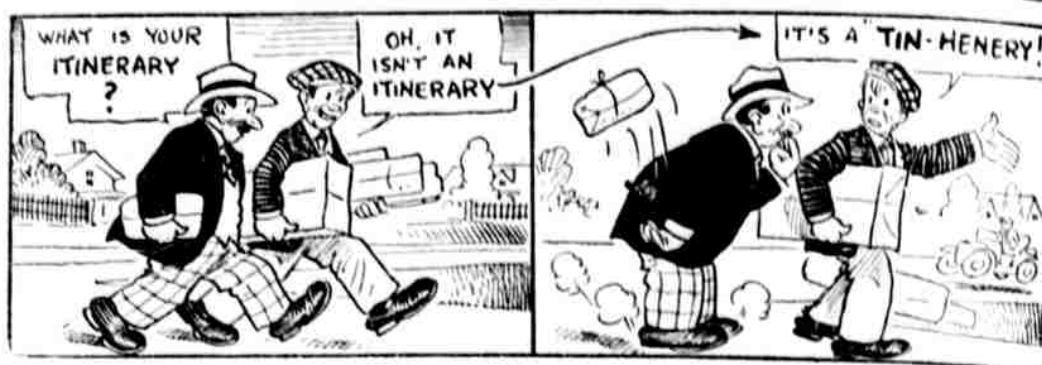
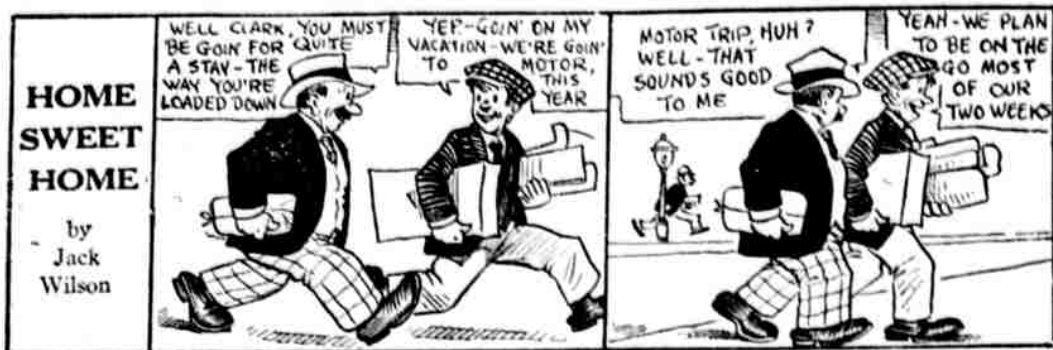

HOME OF WORLD WAR IS QUIET

Villa Supplies His Army With Ammunition Smuggled From United States Across Border—Captures Carranza's Ammunition.

SARAJEVO, Bosnia, Aug. 27.—The war seems likely soon to become a matter of only historical interest even here in Sarajevo where Prinzp threw the bomb which killed the Austrian Ferdinand and set the world aflame.

The summer park at Ilidza is crowded on Sunday with holiday-makers. The trams and trains run regularly. Moving picture theatres are open, and concerts are held from time to time. Recently the city has been the distinction of American sailors on leave from Adriatic ports. All visitors in the city find an immense interest in the wonderful Turkish quarter, with its quaint bazaars where one may buy the most beautiful art goods.

The civil authorities at Sarajevo are principally Bosnians and Herzegovinians. Many Serbian officers are seen in the city. The Turks are as Turkish, the Jews as Jewish and the gypsies as gypsy-like as ever. The half hundred mosques still exist to

attract the faithful to their prayers. The Austrians and Germans still struggle to change their colors, and in the cafes the waiters often strive at Serbian which they speak poorly and ask that one speak "Deutsche."

The after-war population of Sarajevo is 65,000. The city is capital of Bosnia-Herzegovina. The population of the province is divided as follows: 800,000 Musselmans, 800,000 Serbians, 200,000 Croats. The worshippers of Mahomet are not necessarily of Turkish blood; in fact most of them are said really to be Serbians and to speak Serbian. The true facts regarding nationalities in the Balkans cannot be easily determined.

RUMOR MONGER RUNS AMUCK

Chance That a Railway Line May Run From a Point on the Southern Pacific in Northeastern Direction Toward Pokegama.

The question of railroad construction is again beginning to receive the attention of the rumor monger, and the latest stories to be spread on this important question is that plans are under way for the construction of a line from a point on the Southern Pacific near Worden, in a northeastern direction toward Pokegama. The purpose of this line is to tap all of the immense timber belt that is west of the Upper Klamath Lake. Engineers have been at work on this survey for some weeks. Whether this survey is being made by the Southern Pacific company or some private timber company has not appeared on the surface yet. It is known that the man who is in charge of the surveying crew was at one time a member of the E. P. Hoey surveying party that completed the construction of the line between here and Weed, but whether he is still in the employ of the Southern Pacific or one in authority could be found to say.

Another story connected with this surveying party is that the lines are being run by the big timber people for the purpose of bringing about a blocking up of the various holdings in this territory. There is some color to this phase of it, for it is a well known fact that strenuous efforts have been put forward for some time to bring about such a deal. The principal party to these negotiations is the Western Pacific Timber company. This company has some of the finest timber on the west side, but its holdings are so scattered as to make them very unattractive to the big timber buyers. When the California Cannery Association decided to build a mill and box factory for its own use, it came to this territory first. It was offered the Western Pacific timber at a price that was very attractive, but investigation on their part disclosed the fact that it would be almost impossible to log it on account of its scattered condition. An effort was made at that time to block it up, but those interested in seeing the company come in here became possessed of the idea that it would come in anyway, and no real effort was put forth to bring about the result it demanded. When the California concern saw this it quietly sought other fields, with the result that it located, under a very attractive arrangement, near Susanville. This was an eye-opener for the big fellows up here, and then began a real campaign of bring about the result that the California concern asked for.

Here again Dame Rumor enters with the story that the Long-Bell people then entered the market for this timber, and took an option on it, which option it has not yet exercised. Soon after this option was given there was held in this city a conference between the Weyerhaeuser, Hopkins, Western Pacific and Oshkosh companies, instigated, it is alleged, at the suggestion of the Long-Bell people. The result of that conference is said to be quite promising, and it is with this that the surveying party now in the field had to do according to one of the stories afloat.

Another story is that this surveying party has to do with the Long-Bell plans, the object being to ascertain if it will be possible to get a line into this timber from some point between here and Dorris.

Meats in Storage Not "Hoarded"

Live stock is a seasonal crop—like cereals and grains.

It is "ripe" and is marketed in larger quantities in certain months. This causes a natural oversupply at one time and a natural shortage at another.

- 62 per cent (approximate) is pork and beef cuts, etc., cured and in process of curing. It takes 30 to 90 days in pickle or salt to complete the curing process.
- 12 per cent is frozen pork, of which more than three-quarters is to be cured in the next few months.
- 7 per cent is lard. This is a normal supply and only four-fifths of a pound per capita, and much of it will have to go to supply European needs.
- 19 per cent is frozen beef and lamb, and miscellaneous meats, part of which is owned by the Government and was intended chiefly for overseas shipment. If this were all diverted to domestic trade channels it would be only 2 1/2 lbs. per capita—a 5 days' supply.

From this it will be seen that "meats in storage" represent unfinished goods in process of curing and the working supply necessary to assure the consumer a steady flow of finished product.
