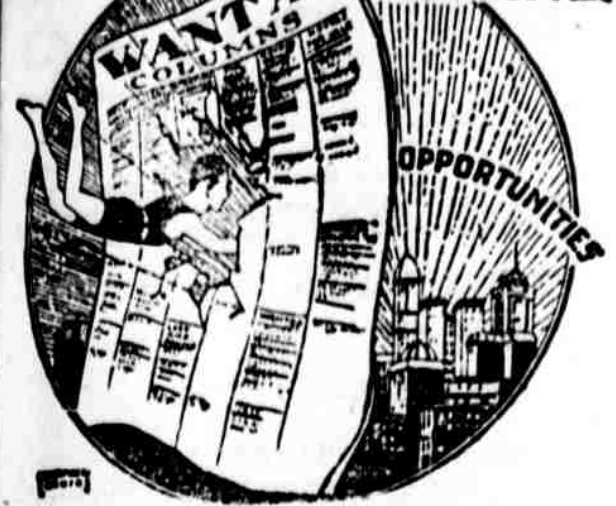

DECLARES STRIKE TWO-EDGED WEAPON FOR LAST RESORT

LONDON, Aug. 29.—The strike was characterized as "a two-edged weapon," which should be used only as a last resort in enforcing workers' demands by James Henry Thomas, a member of Parliament for Derby and general secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen in his first public address after returning from a visit to the United States where he studied the labor situation.

America had strengthened her economic situation during the war and controlled or produced everything that the rest of the world required, Mr. Thomas declared. Unless England at once repaired the damage of the past four years, he said, disaster would stare the country in the face.

The speaker said he believed that the government itself did much to popularize the strike by refusing to the conciliation table today what they would concede tomorrow merely on the threat of a strike.

"The first essential is that confidence immediately be restored to the working classes," Mr. Thomas stated. "Employers must realize that the men and women who were responsible for saving the country expected fair and square dealing while workers, on their part, must not be carried away by the mistaken notion that wealth consisted in more paper money—but must remember that the nation had to regain not only self-confidence, but the confidence of the world."

LEAVE FOR CALIFORNIA

Miss Emma Keady and Miss Hazel Givan left for Los Angeles Wednesday morning. Their going was for a time threatened by the prospects of a strike of the railroad men, but they finally decided to take the chance, deciding to go to the southern city from San Francisco by boat if traffic between the two cities is interrupted.

SEIZURE OF SOCIAL DISEASE REMEDIES REACHES BIG TOTAL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—Four hundred and fifty seizures of so-called remedies for social diseases have been made recently under the food and drug act by federal officials who have inaugurated a campaign to suppress this variety of "quack" medicine. In making this announcement today the Bureau of Chemistry of the Department of Agriculture issued a general warning that use of such "remedies" was extremely dangerous and likely to lead to a long period of suffering.

"The goods seized include a great variety of compounds," said the bureau's announcement. "Some of the labels bear the claim of the manufacturer that the contents are pure cures. Some even contain statements that cures will be effected within definite periods.

"In all the seizure actions the Government alleged the preparations to be falsely and fraudulently labeled. Such preparations are sold largely because of plausible but false claims regarding their curative effect. Many sufferers are led to believe that cures will be effected by these preparations, and adequate treatment under competent medical supervision is neglected until permanent injury to health and even danger to life has resulted."

SALEM, Aug. 28.—State Printer Arthur Lawrence, whose resignation was accepted late yesterday by the state printing board, issued a statement denying any differences that were rumored to have existed between himself and Governor Olcott.
