

THOUSANDS OF DUCKS DIE FROM DRINKING LAKE ALKALI WATER

Thousands of ducks have died during the past week or more in Lower Klamath Lake from drinking the alkali water that has been formed due to the lowering of the lake, according to Barney Chambers, proprietor of the Gun Store on Main street.

A few ducks died last year from the same cause, according to Mr. Chambers, but this year the mortality has reached serious proportions. The ducks grow sick immediately after drinking the water and never leave the lake. Mr. Chambers believes that the government should immediately take hold of the matter and prevent the destruction of the birds.

Local sportsmen have been greatly interested in the recent arrival at the Gun Store of a 12-gauge shotgun from the Winchester factory, the exact duplicate of 50,000 or more guns that were used by many of the Yankee doughboys in mowing down the Germans in mass attack. The gun shoots 21 buckshot and holds six shells. It is equipped with a special perforated radiator for cooling purposes. A long steel bayonet is used on the gun. The use of this gun caused the Huns to issue statements of protests, saying that the Americans were violating all rules of international warfare.

KNIGHTS MAKE BIG RECORD IN SERVICE

The following article clipped from the editorial page of the San Francisco Examiner gives an idea of the splendid work done by the Knights of Columbus in their great war work campaign:

"The accounting made by the Knights of Columbus for its part of the United War Drive Fund reveals that work admittedly well done has been achieved at a surprisingly low overhead cost.

"Of the \$25,000,000 assigned to this organization out of the total fund of \$170,500,00 contributed to the united fund there had been spent at the end of the first fiscal year on June 30, last, 5,468,060.79 for work in the United States, an \$9,550,82.62 for work overseas, including \$7,000,000 for the distribution of free comforts to Americans in the service.

"Altogether, 461 buildings and 39 tents were operated at home and 250 huts and clubs abroad.

"And the administration cost it all was only \$1,116,616.76, or ap-

proximately ONE PER CENT of the turn-over.

"For every worker who could be sent abroad there were SEVEN VOLUNTEERS. The volunteers at home were innumerable.

"These figures unfold an inspiring story of devotion with efficiency.

"They help to make clear why among the homecoming veterans there is such unanimity of appreciation.

"The war work of the Knights of Columbus was guided throughout not only by high purpose and unflagging zeal, but also by a practical perception of what our soldiers needed and an intelligent understanding of human nature.

"It forms a chapter in the nation's war experience which may always be read with pride."
