### FEW VOTE FOR GOV'T CONTROL

Chambers of Commerce Over the Country Show Decided Opposition Against the Government Ownership of Country's Railroads

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 12.—The referendum of the United States Chamber of Commerce, composed of the Chambers of Commerce and trade organizations in every state in the union, had for the purpose of ascertaining the desires of the business organizations of the country as to the disposition of the railroads now under control of the United States Railroad Administration, has been voted upon by practically every commercial organization in this country with the

result that out of a total of 1,458 votes cast, only 11 votes were recorded in favor of government ownership.

The Portland Chamber of Commerce was among those who voted in favor of the following program:

I—Adherence to the policy of corporate ownership and operation, with comprehensive regulation;

II—Return of roads to corporate operation as soon as remedial legislation can be enacted;

III—Adherence to the period of federal control as now fixed unless and until impossibility of remedial legislation in this period clearly appears;

IV—Permission for consolidation in the public interest, with prior approval by government authority, in a limited number of strong competing systems;

V—A Requirement that railroad companies engaging in interstate commerce become federal corporations, with rights of taxation and police regulation reserved for states;

VI—Exclusive federal regulation of capital expenditures and security issues of railroads engaged in interstate commerce with provision for notice and hearing for state authorities;

VII—Federal regulation of intrastate rates affecting interstate commerce;

VIII—A statutory rule providing that rates in each traffic section shall yield an adequate return on a fair value of the property as determined by public authority;

IX—Payment into a fund of a share of the excess earned by any railroad system under application of the above statutory rule over an equitable minimum return upon fair value of property, this fund to be used as Congress directs for strengthening general railroad credit and increasing general railroad efficiency;

X—A federal transportation board to promote development of a national system of rail, water, and highway transportation and articulation of all transportation facilities.

The United States Chamber of Commerce has sent broadcast a call requesting organizations in every community to urge their representatives in Congress to favor such legislation as will bring about the early transfer of the railroads from federal control back to corporate operation.
