that a certain policy he had proposed was "impossible." Mr. Cobdon replied "If that is true we shall begin at once for we have much to do."

Americans and Canadians know they have only touched the resources of their countries. The same devotion to the common objects of victory in peace that was dominant in war will bring new and larger prosperity than we have known.

The first step to national development is to cure international peace and to remove the fear that hangs over small nations. It is a glory of the English speaking nations that they were quite as wholeheartedly united in Paris to draft a League of Nations to garner the fruits of war as they were to win the peace which only internal vigilance will preserve. America and Great Britain, France, Italy and other free nations which were united in war are united in peace.

The world looks to them to mobilize to peace as they mobilized for war. They have taken the first step, who will take the necessary steps until unborn conditions will point to the establishment of the League of Nations as the greatest event in history since the wise men of the East saw the star at Bethlehem?
