

# RUINS TYPIFY MEXICAN HATE

Ruins of Ojinaga, Located Opposite Texas Town, Show Results of Devastation for Years by Recurring Mexican Revolutions

OJINAGA, Mexico, Sept. 13.—Rearing their crumbling walls along the skyline of the south bank of the Rio Grande, the ruins of Ojinaga, opposite Presidio, Texas, tragically exemplify the ravages wrought in Mexico by eight years of revolution.

The town, which has been frequently mentioned in the news dispatches recently, as the headquarters of General Antonio Pruneda, who was instructed by his superiors to co-operate with the American punitive expedition, has been bombarded several times and has been in the hands of many masters.

Years ago it was a flourishing little city, doing considerable business with the American side. Today it is a wreck. The custom-

house, the walls of which are gaily decorated in colors of pathetic tawdriness, as if to conceal the underlying shabbiness of the structure, the ancient church, which has escaped comparatively scathless; the flat-roofed, one story military headquarters, a few dingy shops—these are the Ojinaga that is. And scattered throughout the town are the empty and cracked shells of buildings that were.

Ojinaga's ruin is more nearly complete than that of most other revolt-cracked Chihuahua towns. Chihuahua City, too, has been battered and buffeted by war, but it still wears at least the semblance of some prosperity. Juarez has gone thru many an ordeal of fire and sword; yet it retains a certain air of bustle and gaiety.

Not so with Ojinaga. Her own citizens are quickest to admit the town's utter desolation; but they are also quick to add that when normal conditions are restored, Presidio's twin again will come into her own.

## ROADS ELECTRIFIED

MILAN, Sept. 13.—Signor De Vito, minister of transportation, has announced that 3600 miles of Italian railways will be gradually electrified.

## PRUSSIAN FLAGS LAID IN MUSEUM

WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES IN GERMANY, Sept. 13.—In connection with the winding up of the old German army it is said that the non-commissioned officers' school at Potsdam has been dissolved and the men either discharged or sent to regimental schools. All Prussian war flags are to be sent to Berlin for preservation in a museum. Since the armistice some regiments have retained their battle flags.

German newspapers recently published reports that 150 naval flags had been stolen by German workmen from a great quantity assembled in Danzig and were exchanged as souvenirs with men of the British warship "Coventry," in return for cigarettes, smoking tobacco and chocolate.

## CRITICS BELIEVE COSTLY PICTURE HAS BEEN FOUND.

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, Sept. 13.—A British army officer recently purchased for seven and one-half shillings (\$1.80) in a Pretoria auction room a picture which art critics believe to be a missing Rembrandt—a work of priceless value. The picture, portraying the Crucifixion, has been sent to advisors of the Great Art Gallery at the Hague for examination. The theory is that the picture was brought to South Africa by a member of a family of Dutch noblemen who were patrons of Rembrandt.

## EARL OF ATHLONE MADE BRIGADIER GENERAL.

LONDON, Sept. 13.—The London Gazette announces that the Earl of Athlone, Second Life Guards and personal aide de camp to the King, has been made a brigadier general. The Earl is the third son of the late Duke of Teck and brother of the Queen.

The first holder of the title of the Earl of Athlone was Lieutenant General Bentinck, an ancestor of Count Godard Bentinck, the present host of Count Hohenzollern at Amerongen, Holland. He took a leading part under William of Orange in winning the Battle of the Boyne, regarded by some as the beginning of the present troubles in Ireland.
