LARGEST TUNNEL IN WORLD BUILT THRU SOLID GRANITE BANK

SEATTLE, Sept. 17.—Construction of a fourteen-mile tunnel through solid granite—the largest of its kind in the world—is to be part of the engineering feats connected with the Methow-Okanogan irrigation project in Washington. This project, when completed will furnish irrigation for approximately 45,000 acres of land. The cost of the development voted by the districts embraced in the project, and to be aided by the state, is estimated at \$8,000,000. Four years will be required to build

The Methow-Okanogan project is but part of an ambitious program of reclamation work undertaken by Washington, and made possible by the recently passed state reclamation act.
