OPPOSE EXTENSION OF LIMITS OF YELLOWSTONE.

CODY, Wyo., Sept. 18.—Proposed extension of the boundaries of Yellowstone national park to include the Jackson country is condemned in a resolution adopted recently by residents of this city in a mass meeting here. The resolution declares the plan is being furthered by those who would serve personal ends rather than public good. "This area contains vast resources of unexplored wealth which, developed, should accrue to the state of Wyoming and her people, the resolution reads. "The closing of this vast area is detrimental to the stock and ranch interests of the state of Wyoming."

- 1178—William Gaston, the first Roman Catholic judge of the North Carolina supreme court, born at New Barn, N. C., January 23, 1844.
