Courses in other subjects will also be offered if there is a demand for them. No tuition charges will be made.

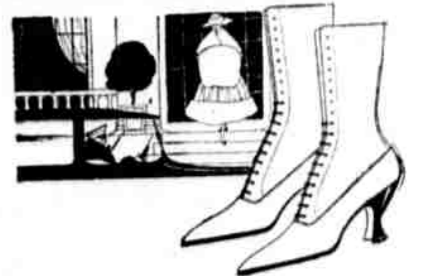
School will be open on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday evening from seven to nine. 23-6t
