

SHIPMENTS OF POTATOES ARE MUCH SMALLER

Cars of potatoes to be shipped from the 1919 crop from the 16 principal late potato shipping states are figured at 123,518 cars by the bureau of crop estimates, as compared with 146,048 cars from the 1918 crop of the same states. The crop in the east is nearly equal to last year, although there are recent reports of severe damage from blight and rot on Long Island and elsewhere in the east.

The probable commercial onion production of the United States is estimated at 21,569 cars against 26,792 cars last year, 24,725 cars in 1917 and 12,124 cars in 1916.

The cabbage output of the nine leading states is placed at 31,066 cars, compared with 41,247 cars last year, 38,017 cars in 1917 and 20,000 cars in 1916.

A tomato pack of 8,151,000 cases is expected this year as against 15,882,372 cases last year.

The commercial acreage of celery in the seven principal northern producing states is 8,760 compared with 9,385 last year and 10,035 in 1917.

The decrease this year is chiefly in Michigan. California has 2,800 acres against 2,900 last year and 5,50 two years ago.
