

Products that Packers Sell

Their Number Grossly Exaggerated

The Federal Trade Commission has published a list of some 640 articles said to be sold by the packers.

This list is ridiculously padded in order to scare people into the belief that the packers are getting control of the food supply of the nation.

For example, the list includes not only "beef sides" and "beef cuts," but also over 60 other items of beef products and by-products.

Over 90 articles listed are not sold to the outside trade but are raw materials and supplies, such as brick, cement, etc., used by Swift & Company in carrying on its business.

Glaring duplications appear, such as "sardines" and "canned sardines"; "butterine" and "oleomargarine"; "dried sausages" and "drysausage," etc.

The list includes 37 kinds of sausage; 4 different kinds or preparations of beef tongue, etc., etc.

BARON SAITO SEEKS UNITY

SEOUL, Korea, Sept. 1.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Admiral Baron Saito, the new governor of Korea, appeals, in an interview in the Seoul Press, to Japanese and Koreans alike to co-operate and "preserve brotherly relations" in developing the resources of the peninsula.

"It is especially to be hoped that Korean leaders will pay great attention to this," the baron said. "We must learn from the Americans in this respect. If we are industrious enough we may convert even the barren land into a fertile one."

To emphasize this suggestion the baron described the rapid development of the iron industry in the United States, attributing this in part to the enterprise of Americans.

Pointing out that the present is a period of the greatest moment in the destiny of the Japanese empire, the baron said, Japan as one of the great powers stood in a position where even her minor actions would affect the general situation of the world the responsibility of the Japanese people had become heavier than ever.

To fulfill this responsibility, especially to promote the civilization, peace and welfare of the Far East,

he said the Japanese must always keep in touch with the progress of the world and exert themselves to the utmost to make themselves the stronger. In all national dealings the strength of a nation gave weight to its claims, he declared, and for that reason every Japanese must put forth his greatest efforts for the development of the national resource and to increase the national strength.

Japan, however, he said, must beware of abusing what strength it has. A civilized people, he declared, should behave with fairness and modesty and strive to enjoy peace and prosperity by keeping in harmonious relations with other peoples.

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STANDARD SET FOR LONDON BUILDING

LONDON, Aug. 27. (Correspondence of The Associated Press.)—Specifications of the new standard houses, complete from the composition of mortar and cement and the thickness of the walls to such details as niches for bedroom dressers and hooks for garden clothes-lines, have been issued by the Ministry of Health. The standard houses, with alterations where necessary to meet local conditions, will be constructed in all government-aided housing projects.

The prospective resident, with a set of these specifications may follow the construction of his home from the excavation stage through the bricklaying and fitting and painting. Standard drain pipes, sinks, cisterns, bathroom and laundry appliances, cupboards, cloak rails, doors, and windows are specified. Indicating the substantial character of the houses it is proposed to build under these specifications, no outer wall is to be less than nine inches thick. Each house is to have its own hot water supply system.

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
