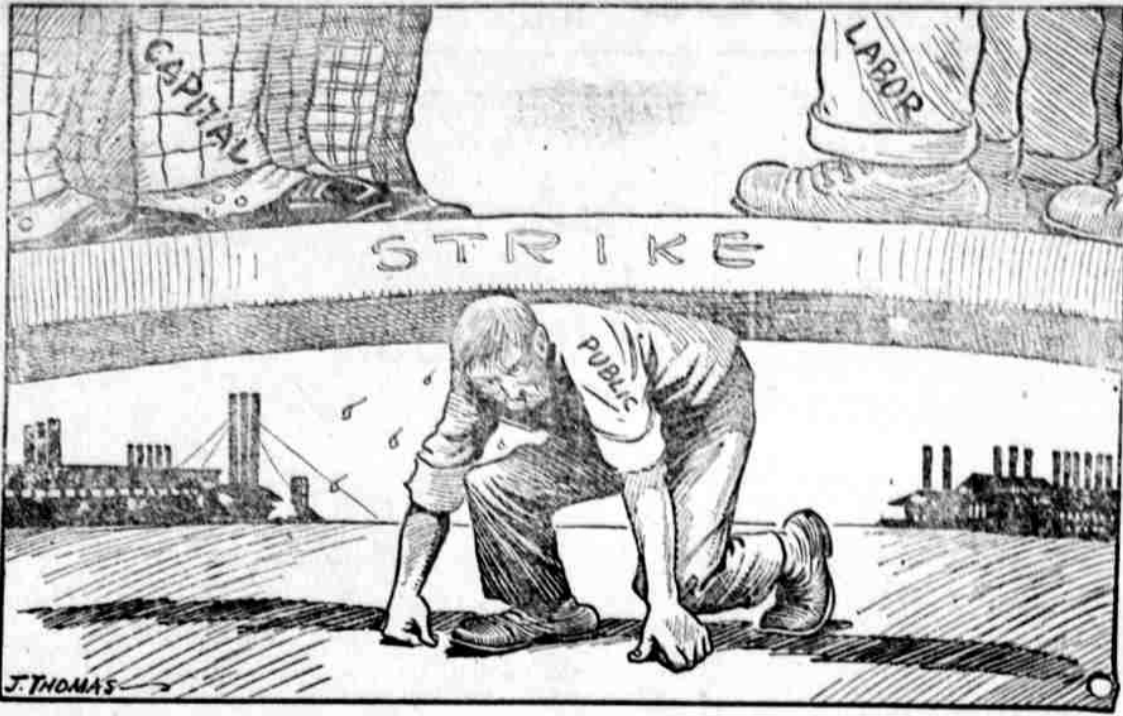


THE TEST OF STRENGTH

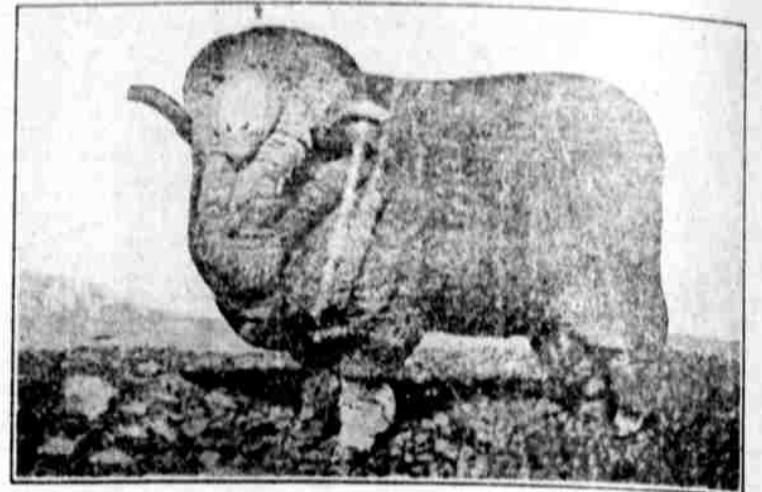

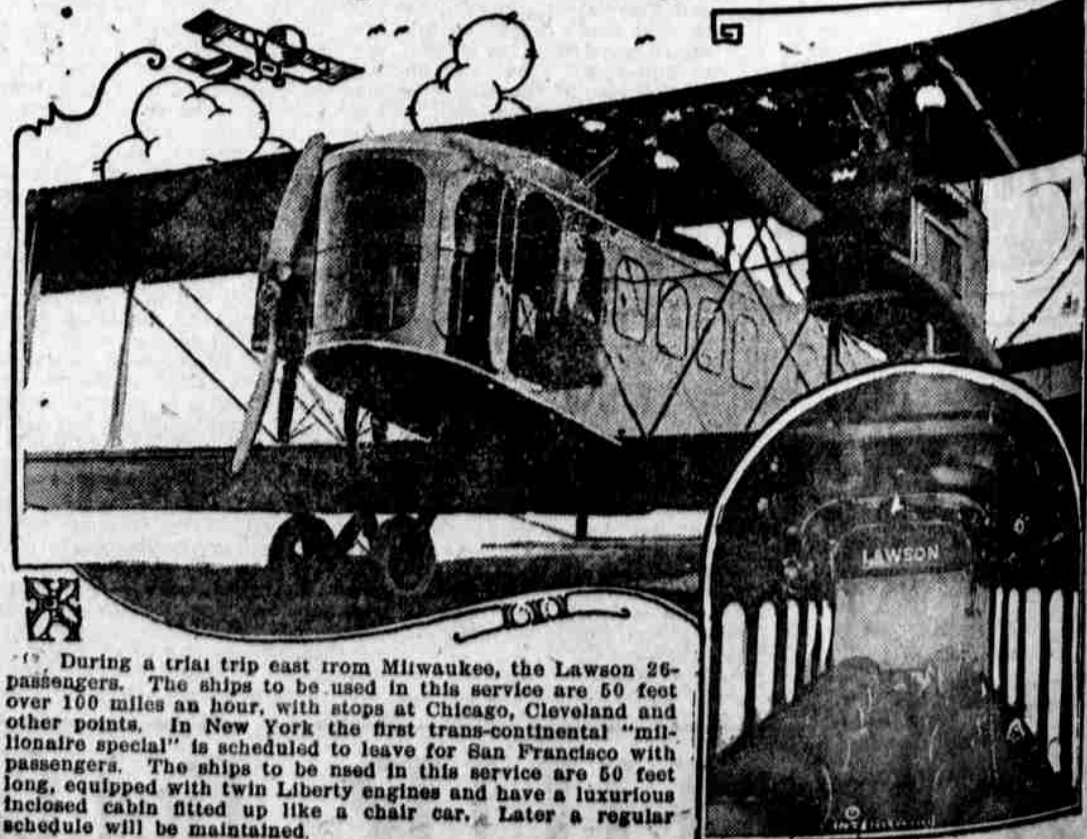
