

STANFORD MEN OBJECT TO FEE

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Oct. 24.—Opposition to the decision of the board of trustees to charge tuition of \$40 a quarter at Stanford is growing among the students, according to the Daily Palo Alto, the student newspaper. "The students' viewpoint," the newspaper said recently, "as a rule is not far away from that of the alumni and faculty."

Objection to the new ruling, as outlined by the Daily Palo Alto, is based on:

"To announce at this time that in January the new system will take effect is not just to those students now registered at the university," the Daily Palo Alto said.

"The paper further objected to changing Stanford from a 'free university' to a 'pay-as-you-enter college.'"

"The founding grant of the university as written by Mrs. Stanford, the newspaper noted, states that 'The university has been endowed with a view to offering instruction free, or nearly free, that it may resist the tendency to stratification in society, by keeping open an avenue whereby the deserving and exceptional may rise through their efforts from the lowest to the highest stations in life. A spirit of equality must accordingly be maintained within the university.'"

SCRIPTURAL TEXT TAMES PRISONERS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 24.—The finding of a passage in the Bible recently lead Frank E. Harris of Denver, Colo., and Jesse F. Blake of Pike Springs, Ark., to abandon a "prison strike" at the United States Disciplinary Barracks on Alcatraz Island, San Francisco bay, the Federal prison officials said.

The two men, said to have been leaders among a group of "conscientious objectors" confined on the island who had refused to work, said they dropped their trouble making tactics when they noted this passage in Romans XIII, verses 1 and 2:

"Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers. For there is no power but of God; the powers that be are ordained of God.

"Whosoever therefore resisteth the power, resisteth the ordinance of God; and they that resist shall receive to themselves damnation."

ALASKA HUSKIES HIT BY H. C. L.

NENANA, Alaska, Sept. 20. (By Mail)—Alaska winter trail dogs, who are "summer boarders" at dog "farms" along the Yukon river and its tributaries, suffered the general fate of boarders this year by having their board raised on account of the scarcity of fish, their main food. The usual rate of \$4.00 per month was raised to \$7.00 and \$8.00 by some "farms."

Operations of a commercial fish cannery near the mouth of the Yukon it is generally believed, has reduced the number of fish that reach the upper waters of the system. Before the cannery was started no fish shortage was reported.

Nels Stol, a Nenana "sourdough" who conducts a dog "farm" near here said he was not able to catch enough fish this summer to feed his seventy "boarders." As a result he had to buy other food which has raised in price. Even at \$7.00 a month, he estimated he was barely breaking even.

BEETLE IN SAMOA

PAGO PAGO, Tuvalu Island, American Samoa, Sept. 15.—(By Mail)—The cocoon beetle has appeared in the Islands of Manua and large groves of coconut palms are being destroyed.

The islanders are believed to have brought the pest from British Samoa.
