ENGLISH CLERGY WANTS MORE PAY

WIMBORNE, England, Oct. 7. (By Mail.)—Clergymen, following the example of physicians and other professional men in England, are forming a trade union for the purpose of securing better conditions and more pay. The Rev. C. W. Lloyd-Evans, vicar of the parish church at Milborne St. Andrew, in the heart of Dorsetshire, is leading the movement, and he is in receipt of letters from clergymen in all all parts of the country pledging support. Most of his correspondents unite in scoring bishops. One says: "The clergy may go to the workhouse for all the bishops care." "We want a regular trade union," writes still another, proposing "a clerical strike if our demands are not listened to and our grievances redressed by those in authority without delay." Mr. Lloyd-Evans, says the clergymen, when organized, will demand a minimum salary of \$2500 a year, and increased pensions.

RUSSIAN 'GREEN' GROUP MENACE

LONDON, Oct. 10.—(Correspondence the Associated Press.)—The "greens" of Russia, often referred to as the "green army," constitute a force that must be seriously reckoned with, in the opinion of Russian experts at the British foreign office. Their opinion is based upon a report of one of their secret agents who for months has been in a position to closely study conditions in Bolsheviki Russia. The majority of the "greens" are deserters from the Bolsheviki armies but in their ranks may be found nearly every political element in the country excepting Bolsheviki. They have no idea of governmental plans, should they gain the upper hand, their one idea being to kill Bolsheviki and Jews. They take no prisoners and care for none of the enemy's wounded, the agents say. It is estimated that in the spring of 1919 50 per cent of the Bolsheviki soldiers deserted. Augmented by other malcontents they organized themselves into guerrilla bands, living off the country and obtaining ammunition from raids on Bolsheviki stores. Reports to the foreign office show that the peasants are so hostile to the Bolsheviki that they assist the "greens" in every way they can. The "green" bands grew and dur-

ing the summer caused no end of trouble for the Bolsheviki. Undoubtedly a goodly percentage of the "greens" will rejoin the Bolsheviki this winter, as the severe cold of Russia precludes guerilla warfare, but officials here believe the winter will not kill the movement and that it will be more formidable next summer.

HAIG IS BLOCKED FROM HIGH TITLE

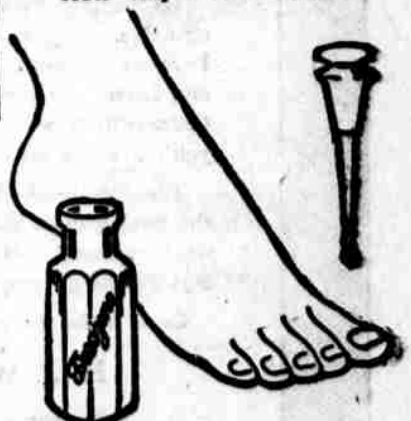
LONDON, Oct. 3. (By Mail.)—Field Marshal Lord Haig does not after all become "Earl Haig of Bemerseyde," as he had wished, but "Earl of Kingston," it is announced. His residence being at Combe there were objections, it is understood, to the territorial designation of Bemerseyde, the Tweedside seat of the head of his family and remote kinsman, Colonel A. H. Haig. There are well defined rules as to the assumption of territorial titles, and the lord of a manor can object to a new peer taking his title from a place over which the former has "rights." Lord Fisher, for example wished to be Lord Thetford, but his Norfolk Manor belonged to W. D. Mackenzie. Lord Strathcona wanted to be Lord Glencoe, but the rights of the ancient Macdonalds stood in the way.
