MEMORIAL FOR U. OF O. HEROES

UNIVERSITY OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 11.—Men of the University of Oregon who died in service are to be honored with some sort of a memorial. Just what form that memorial shall take has been left to a committee of students, faculty and regents. The faculty committee, just appointed by President Campbell, consists of W. F. G. Thacher, professor of rhetoric, chairman; Colin V. Dymont, executive secretary of the Portland center of the extension division of the university, and professor of Journalism; Professor George S. Turnbull, professor of journalism; R. W. Prescott, professor of public speaking; Dr. John F. Board, professor of zoology; Ellis F. Lawrence, dean of the school of agriculture.

The student committee is made up of Lyle McCroskey, of Bellingham, Wash., chairman; Edwin R. Durso of Silverton, and Miss Ella Rowlings of Corvallis.

These two committees will co-operate with a similar committee of the board of regents made up of J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction; Vernon H. Vawter of Medford, and Mrs. G. T. Gerlinger of Dallas and members of the alumni association.

PRIVATE OWNERSHIP

Superiority Demonstrated in World War

E. N. Hurley, who served throughout the war as chairman of the United States Shipping Board, was asked what in his job had impressed him most. He answered:

"The efficiency of private ownership and operation as compared with public ownership and operation—ALL PRODUCTION CENTERS ON THE COST—you can't get away from that. Shift responsibility for the cost, for the best possible result under a given set of circumstances and you shift the responsibility for efficiency. On the Shipping Board, we shifted this responsibility from private shipbuilding concerns to the Government."

"With the shifting of responsibility of cost to the Government, that keen interest in results which follows private initiative was gone. THERE YOU HAVE THE WHOLE PROBLEM AS BETWEEN PUBLIC OWNERSHIP AND PRIVATE OWNERSHIP STATED."

"I don't know of a government-owned plant that produces more than two-thirds efficiency. In the years to come some way may be found to keep incentive to best endeavor in men under government ownership, but until that is discovered that system may be classed as a failure."

NENANA, Alaska, Sept. 1. (By Mail.)—Trading schooners fairly swarmed in Bering Sea this past season, according to territorial senator J. R. Heckman of Ketchikan, who has just returned from Nome. The schooners, Mr. Heckman said, were particularly active in trading with the Siberian coast, and furs formed a large part of the cargoes. Fur values in the North were well illustrated when white fox pelts obtained on the Siberian side for \$21 a skin, sold at Nome for \$45.

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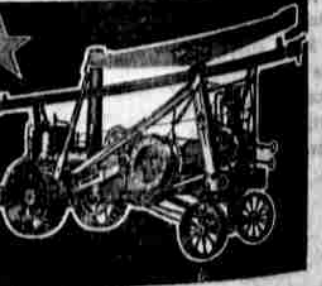
