SNOW-FLAKES

VON MACKENSEN STILL ARROGANT

SALONIKA, Oct. 15.—(Correspondence the Associated Press).—Field Marshal August Von Mackensen, who commanded the German forces which invaded Rumania, and his staff have been brought here by the French military authorities from Northern Serbia and interned just outside the city. The German military leader and his officers are permitted freely to go about the streets, but they usually are accompanied by a French officer. The correspondent, however, observed two of their number were riding horseback on the outskirts of the city without guards. Each officer wore an iron cross and displayed a pride and bravado not quite in keeping with men whose army had been vanquished.

Mackensen has been given a large and comfortable house opposite the French aviation field and overlooking the Aegean sea. It was formerly occupied by the higher French officers and is elegantly furnished. A day or two after his arrival the field marshal strolled through the roadways of the British military encampment, which is many acres in extent, and was amazed at the thoroughness and completeness of everything. The British have since withdrawn from this encampment.

The German generalissimo has changed little in appearance since the war and apparently is not worrying greatly over what fate he may suffer at the hands of the allies. The general impression is that he will be interned here until the allies are ready to try him. It is felt the most serious charge against him is his wanton destruction of the railroads and other property in Rumania after the signing of the armistice.

None of the allied officers of troops now salute him as he walks along the streets of Saloniki. He still retains all his pride in his achievements on the field, for he wears an iron cross and a number of other decorations. These and the gaudy red-trimmed uniform he wears excite no small curiosity among the pedestrians of Saloniki.

Mackensen and his aides suffered a double humiliation while en route through Serbia. They were guarded by a company of Senegalese soldiers and were forced to go through the very tunnel that the former German emperor ordered constructed in 1916 so that his troops might pass through Serbia. There are two inscriptions over it, one in German and the other in French. The first inscription reads:

"The German kaiser ordered this tunnel built so that his troops could pass through Serbia."

The second inscription, which is directly under the German caption, reads:

"General Franchet d'Esperey, the commander-in-chief, ordered his troops to drive the Germans out of Serbia through this tunnel."

Mackensen undoubtedly felt the humiliation of his position, for he pointed to the tablets at the entrance of the tunnel and engaged his officers in conversation on the subject.

MANY BABIES FOR ADOPTION, ENGLAND

LONDON, Oct. 11.—(By Mail).—According to officials of the British National Baby Adoption society, more babies are offered for adoption now in this country than can be placed in suitable homes. Many of the children offered are illegitimate. Some are children of demobilized soldiers whose wives have died or left them. Since the war, it is said, the desire to adopt children is more widespread than ever before.

"Many unmarried women have taken a child," one of the officials said. "The children are sent to the class of homes to which they belong by birth. Many children are adopted by miners, who are very fond of children and will take good care of them."
