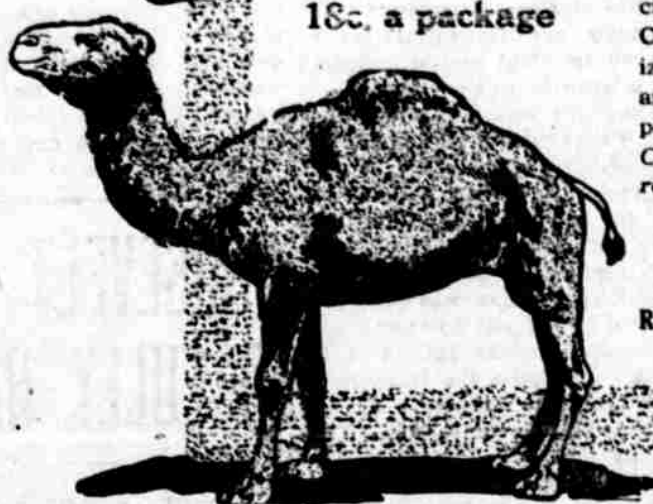

ESTABLISHING TRADING POSTS IN THE ARCTIC

NOME, Alaska, Oct. 20. (By Mail). — Early Arctic winter has halted the summer work of an expedition, headed by Captain Louis Lane, of Nome, sent by Boston, Mass., interests into the Canadian Arctic to establish a string of twenty trading posts.

The new company plans to operate in a section of the continent in which the British Hudson's Bay company has worked for more than

two centuries trading supplies for the furs caught by the natives. A big Boston fur company, it is said, is behind the enterprise.

The expedition went into the north overland through Calgary, Canada last summer with approximately eight carloads of goods and supplies, said to be worth \$240,000. The company also sent in a river power boat to navigate the Mackenzie River, which drains northern Canada and along which the company intends to operate. The boat was sent in sections and was assembled when it reached the headwaters of the river.

This summer was spent by the expedition in working down the Mackenzie. The men expected to reach Herschel Island, near the mouth, by winter. Instead, they reached the vicinity of Fort McPherson, on the lower reaches of the river. They

probably will winter at Fort McPherson and proceed on to the Arctic ocean in the spring.

After getting established the company will supply its trading posts from Nome. Boats with goods and supplies will be sent from here around Point Barrow and along the Arctic coast to the company's stations on the Mackenzie.

NEW LAW OF ATMOSPHERIC DENSITY FOUND

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 18. —Although it has been believed for more than two centuries that ether in of uniform density throughout space its density, as a matter of fact, increases outwardly from all the heavenly bodies directly as the radius, Professor T. J. J. See, the government astronomer at Mare Island, near here, asserted in an address to the California Academy of Sciences here tonight.

In announcing the discovery of "a fundamental law of the density of ether in the celestial spaces and the cause of molecular forces," Professor See said the homogeneity of ether had been taught by such eminent philosophers as Lord Kelvin, Maxwell, Poincare, Lodge, and Larmor, while Sir Isaac Newton in 1721 had believed it to be heterogeneous, with density increasing outwardly from all bodies.

Newton, however, was unable to discover the law of the density or to adduce proof of his opinion, whereas Professor See said tonight that proof of his discovery had been examined by leading American mathematicians and "pronounced incontrovertible."

Professor See presented his findings that "the ether about the sun and stars is filled with electro magnetic waves with amplitudes varying inversely as the distance, which leads to forces varying inversely as the square of the distance." This he said, "explains universal gravitation in the simplest and most conclusive manner."

The concrete result of his discovery, Professor See said, is to show that ether is 219 times denser at the earth than at the sun's surface, where it is only two millionths of a millionth of a millionth of the density of water.

"Although ether has such excessively small density," said the government scientist, "it is able to transmit the stupendous forces required to keep the planets circulating in their elliptical orbits. In the case of the earth this force is the breaking strength of a steel cable eleven inches in diameter on each square foot of a cross section of the globe, as if the earth's surface were almost covered with such cables."

Ether is in reality a gas made up of particles, Professor See said, two billion times smaller than an electron, which Professor Sir J. J. Thomson of Cambridge, England, president of the Royal Society, after 39 years labor, showed to be 1760 times smaller than an atom of hydrogen.

Professor See submitted tables of the properties of hydrogen, helium, oxygen and other gases to show their "mean free path," that is, the length of trajectory between successive collisions of their molecules, to be about one half millionth of an inch.

As compared with this Professor See calculated the free path of ether particles at nearly 2,000 miles, about the distance from San Francisco to St. Louis. "But in addition to this extreme length of free path," said the professor, "ether particles have the enormous velocity of 250,000 miles per second, one third faster than light."

"It is a virtue of its highly elastic properties, 1,148, 770,000, 000 times greater than that of air, in proportion to its density, that ether can swing the planets about the sun without disrupting itself."

In the latter part of his address Professor See dealt with the molecular forces as due to short waves in the ether. In this way he explained the figures of rain drops, drops of dew, globules of mercury and the round figure taken by shot and other molten metals. The waves, he said always act to make the surface of a liquid drop a minimal surface, which is shown by mathematicians to be that of a sphere.

"Capillarity, chemical affinity, surface tension, adhesion, and cohesion" were attributed by Professor See to wave action. Heretofore, he said, the mystery of molecular forces has challenged the ingenuity of philosophers.

Professor See, who attracted the attention of the scientific world in 1917 by a treatise on the cause of gravitation, published in Boston, London and Paris, said the old world was so much injured by the war that scientific progress for a long time to come would depend mainly upon America.

"We can not expect any real light from Europe," he said, "and the public should therefore accustom itself to supporting American leadership in science."

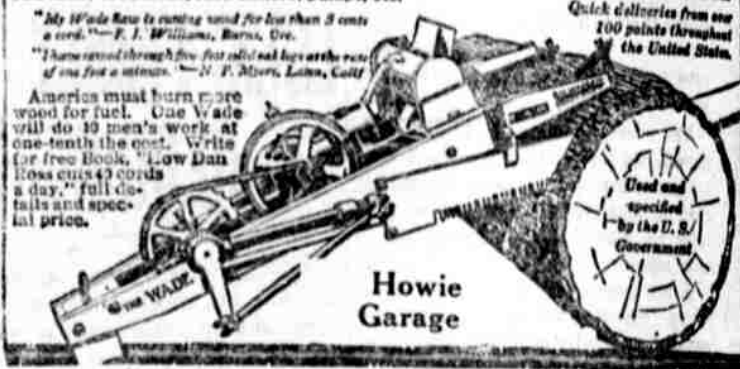
