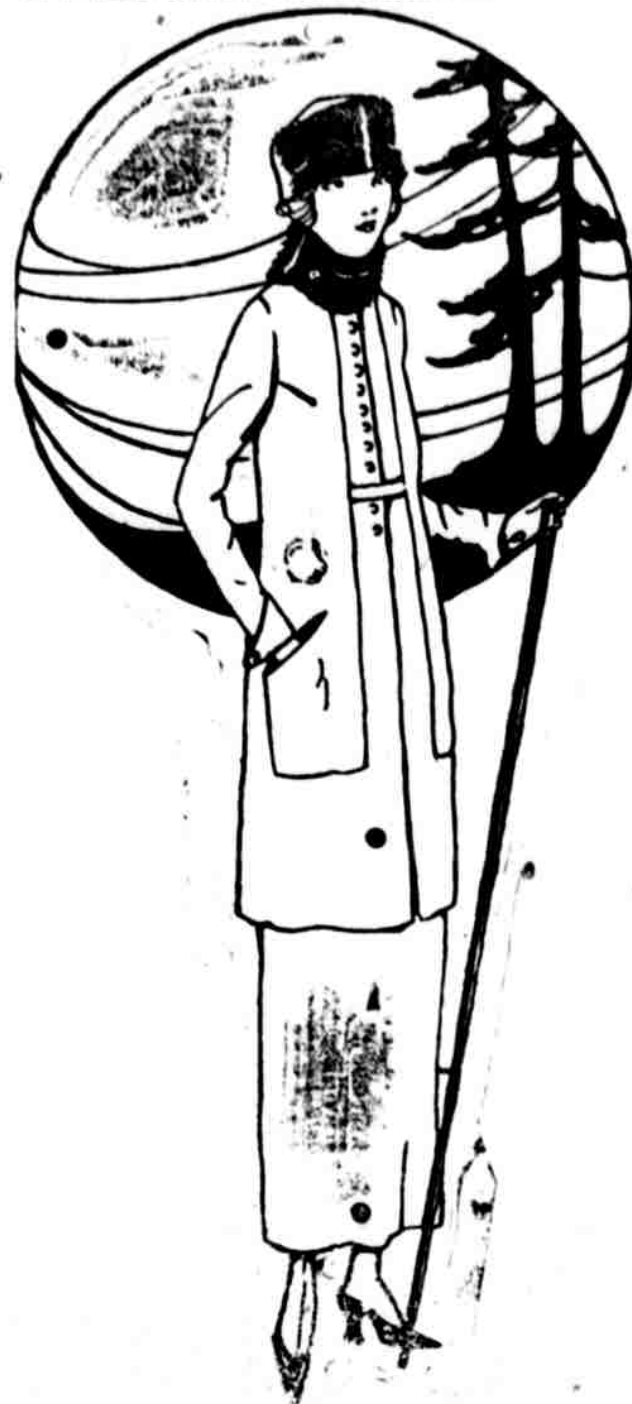
Frank Grohs is in the city today from his ranch in upper Langell Valley.
