## ELECTRICITY IS SUPREME ON DREADNAUGHT

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 28.—The superdreadnaught California, launched at Mare Island recently, is a voracious electric ship.

Besides supplying her driving power, electricity is used to hoist the ammunition, rotate the turrets, operate the 14-inch guns, steer the ship, raise and lower the anchor, pump fresh and salt water, operate the machinery in the machine shop, carpenter shop and printing establishment, supply fresh air for ventilation, raise and lower the boats, operate the refrigeration plant, operate the searchlights and radio equipment. In the kitchen electricity peels the potatoes, washes the dishes, makes the ice cream, grinds the meat, mixes the dough, cuts the butter and in many other ways lightens the labors of the sailor lads.

The chief advantage of electric drive for a battleship is fuel economy. Fuel economy is far more important aboard ship than ashore, naval officers point out, for a ship must carry her own fuel, and the longer a ship's fuel will last, the greater her radius of action. The greatest saving occurs at the usual cruising speed of about 18 knots. As compared with the battleships driven by turbines directly coupled to the propellers, it is estimated that the California will save, while cruising, about 30 per cent of her fuel. This is because both the turbines and the propellers can rotate at their best and most economical speed, which, it is contended, is often impossible when steam is used to drive the screws.

Energy to operate the great battleship is taken aboard in the form of crude oil. This is burned under boilers that develop the steam power which in turn generates electric power. The nozzles underneath the boilers are adjusted to mix the air with the oil so that the oil will burn completely without smoke. However, if it is desired to throw a smoke screen, by merely increasing the oil supply, inky blackness will vomit from the California's single smokestack.

From each of the two generators large copper cables convey the electricity to the control board. The control board is equipped with levers and handles whereby the engineers of the California will control the electrical propelling machinery. The navigating office sends word by loud speaking telephones or electrical indicators. One engineer standing at the control board can start the vessel forward or backward, and vary the speed in either direction as required. He can run all four of the 7000 horsepower motors from one of the generators or from the other. He can even split up the load so that one of the generators can run two of the motors forward and the other generator run the other two motors "astern" in order to turn the ship quickly.

## JAP POSTMEN ARE DEMANDED

TOKIO, Nov. 30.—(By Mail).—Great difficulties are being experienced by postal authorities throughout Japan in obtaining applicants for the work of postman, as strong men prefer more remunerative employment in these days of high wages. This is one of the causes for the congestion of mails and delay of delivery.

A meeting of the local postmasters recently held in Aichi prefecture adopted the suggestion to employ women as mail carriers after the example in some western countries. The application is now in the hands of the department of communications.
