WOULD COMPEL GOVERNOR TO RUN IN 1920

SALEM, Dec. 2.—G. M. Roberts, district attorney of Jackson county, today filed in the supreme court a petition for a writ of mandamus to compel Ben W. Olcott, as secretary of state to certify the office of governor to the county clerks of the state as one of the offices to be filled at the election in 1920. The application is based on interpretations of the constitutional provision. Roberts, as district attorney, makes the application, he says, because he believes it is the duty of law officers to see that the state laws are complied with.

Note.—Friends of Governor Olcott, who also holds the office of secretary of state, from which he succeeded to the governorship on the death of Governor Withycombe, contend that he is entitled to hold the governor's office until the expiration of the term to which Governor Withycombe was elected, which ends in 1922. Opponents argue that the law entitles him to his seat only until the next election following his succession to office, which is in 1920.

WILL BUILD ON KLAMATH AVENUE
