### Letters From The People

#### BAKER SAYS HE IS NOT CRUSHED.

To the editor of the Evening Herald and my fellow citizens of Klamath County:

After stirring events of the past few days in which I have had a humble part as an opponent of the so-called Ashurst Bill for the opening of the Klamath Reservation, some of my friends have asked me what I am going to do and how I feel after an apparent crushing defeat. To the inquiries, I reply that I am not down-hearted and that I have just begun to fight. I shall meet Mr. Ashurst and his followers on the plains of Washington. For the present I have temporarily withdrawn from the front line trenches and am reorganizing my forces and replenishing my ammunition, with the determined purpose of laying down a barrage on Ashurst which will blow his crafty hopes and high, arrogant ambitions into the Kingdom Come. Compared with some of the fights that I have participated in for the public weal, this little skirmish with Ashurst is a pink tea or

With this dire fate threatening to overwhelm me I turned to the Scriptures and read the story of a man who was thrown into the deep blue sea and swallowed by a whale, remaining inside the belly of said mammal for three long days and nights, but in the end he was vomited forth on dry land. This man won immortality—all on account of being swallowed. His name was Jonah and he has been a Jonah to everybody ever since. The whale that swallowed him sank into the mighty deep and was heard of no more. And then again I read of a man who was foolish enough to insist upon eating the pulse of truth and who refused to dine on

the Kings meat of unrighteousness. He was cast into the den of lions, but walked forth unharmed.
