Charles Lathrop Pack, president of the American Forestry Association, says:

"We want a complete list of famous trees now. There is the Liberty Tree on the campus of St. John's College at Annapolis under which a treaty with the Indians was signed in 1652. The experts tell us this tree is close to 800 years old. We all know of the William Penn Treaty Tree beneath which Washington commanded the continental army. At Oberlin, O., is the elm on the corner of the campus under which was the first log house in which Oberlin College was founded. The American Forestry Association has listed many famous trees but it wants the list complete. If there is a famous tree in your town the Association wants to know about it."

WALKS FAR TO WIN A WAGER

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 9. (By Mail)—Carl Dericks, a Hollander, 37 years old, arrive here a few days ago from Amsterdam and announced his purpose to walk from this city to San Francisco, Cal., in 18 months in order to win a purse of 100,000 florins offered by a party of Dutch Sportsmen.
