CHANGES IN ORBIT OF MOON

Explains Fact That Eclipses Do Not Occur on or About Same Dates Every Year

Lunar eclipses always occur at full moon, or when the sun and moon are in opposition, and are caused by the moon passing through earth's shadow. As the moon in her course passes the earth between herself and the sun once every month, and also places the earth between herself and the sun once a month, it is evident that if she moved in the plane of the ecliptic there would be either a total or annular eclipse of the sun and a total eclipse of the moon every month. They do not happen every full moon because the moon's orbit is inclined to the ecliptic the great circle of the heavens round which the sun seems to travel from west to east in the course of a year, allowing her to pass the sun to an angle of nearly 5 degrees and 9 minutes to the north and south of his track, preventing such a frequent occurrence of eclipses. From the magnitude of the angle of inclination of her orbit to the ecliptic an eclipse can only occur on a full moon happening when the moon is at or near one of her nodes, or points where her orbit intersects the ecliptic. Therefore, if the moon does not travel on the ecliptic, which would result in a lunar eclipse every full moon, it is logical to say that the moon does not follow the same orbit year after year. If the moon followed the same orbit year after year lunar eclipses would occur on or about the same dates every year, but the fact is that they might occur any full moon.—Kansas City Star.

HOLIDAY MAIL SUGGESTIONS

The Department expects this year to be the heaviest Christmas mails ever known and every effort is being made in advance to handle the rush. You want your presents to reach you on time and you also want those you send to arrive promptly. This can only be accomplished by your full co-operation.

First of all mail your outgoing presents early. That means that parcels for points east of the Mississippi river should be mailed not later than ten days before Christmas. For points in the middle west allow a week and for points along the Pacific coast five or six days. Only parcels for local points should be mailed as late as the last day or two before Christmas. The earlier you mail your parcel the safer and better it will travel.

Use extra care in packing. You have spent your good money and your time for your friend's present—don't risk having the present damaged and your friend disappointed because you wrapped it carelessly. Use heavy, strong paper and plenty of good twine. Better have a plain looking parcel on the outside arrive safely than a fancy one all torn up.

Write the address plainly—make it complete, number and all—and on one side of the parcel only. Do not place the Christmas sticker on the address side—better not to use them at all on the outside wrapper as they are confusing and are sometimes mistaken for postage. All Parcel Post must be unsealed so that it can be inspected if necessary.

Now a word about insurance on parcel post. Contrary to general belief insured parcels are not given any different care from other parcels. Insurance simply guarantees you an indemnity in case the parcel is lost or destroyed. You insure your house just the same way. The company does not give your residence any different care, but it does pay your loss if one occurs. The insurance fee is small and it is advisable to insure your valuable parcels. Three cents insures a \$5. value, five cents insures \$25., ten cents to \$50., and twenty-five cents up to \$100.

Small parcels such as rings, watches, fountain pens, jewelry, etc., should be sent in the first class mails and registered. They are then given the best care and protection possible. All registered matter must be sealed by you. Do not bring it to the window in the rush and expect a clerk to seal it for you.

For the incoming mails we will have an extra force of carriers and all patrons of the city delivery service will have their parcels promptly delivered to their address. All parcels delivered up to Christmas Eve will be delivered by Christmas noon and the office will be kept open on Christmas morning for general delivery and box patrons.
