GERMANY ALSO HAS MANY PROFITEERS

COBLENZ, Nov. 17.—(By Mail).—American intelligence officers in the occupied area recently started a campaign against German food speculators who were held responsible for the high prices of food in Coblenz and vicinity. The first day of the "round up" twenty profiteers were deported to unoccupied Germany, with instructions not to return.

As an example of the nature of the dealings carried on by the speculators, or "Schiebers," as they are called in German, an incident is cited by the Americans of a carload of starch shipped into Coblenz. It cost the original purchasers 40,000 marks. The car remained untouched in the railroad yards while it was sold from one man to another, each time at an increase in price, until the carload was finally disposed of for 80,000 marks, just double what the first purchaser paid.

FEDERAL TROOPS RESCUE VICTIM OF MEXICAN REBELS

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 20.—(By Mail).—Federal forces recently rescued T. G. McKenzie, American manager of an electric power plant in Camargo, state of Chihuahua, who had been captured and robbed by rebels and held with a view to ransom, according to reports reaching here.

Mr. McKenzie had set out on horseback from Parral and was taken captive by a small band of men who announced he would be held for ransom. A small boy hiding in the bushes witnessed the attack and ran to Parral, where federal forces were advised and pursuit begun. The bandits were overtaken at nightfall and, after a sharp encounter in which three bandits were killed and one wounded, McKenzie was rescued.

TRADE INCREASING

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 12.—(By Mail).—Great increase in the number of American vessels plying between United States and Brazilian ports was shown when, in October, 33 vessels flying the American flag entered the port of Rio Janeiro. Statistics show that during the entire year of 1914 only 26 American vessels arrive in Rio.
