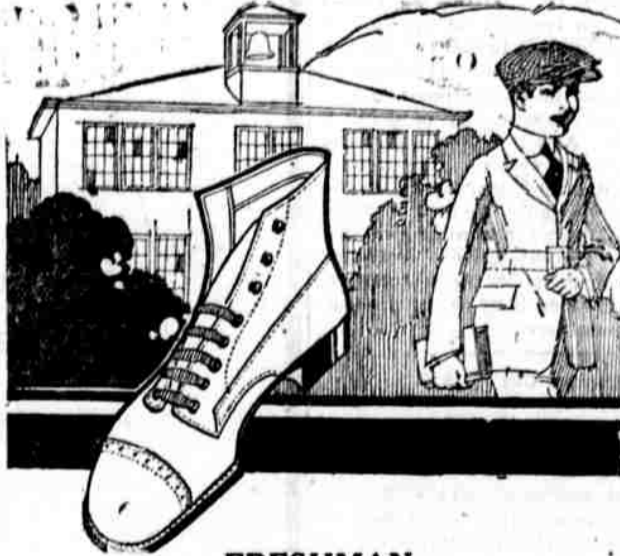

### At the Theatres

"The Love Call" is the most universal thing in the world, and the most insistent. It is the world-old quest of mankind, a thirst, which is never sated, the "desire of the moth for the star, of the night for the morrow."

When mate first called to mate, creation began, and so the search for affinity is the one dominating factor in life.

"When Doctors Disagree" is a real farce. Its basis is one of the most laughable situations ever conceived; its interpretation and pictorial aspects are flawless.

Besides the comic story many other outstanding merits recommend it to exhibitors. Directed by Victor L. Schertzinger, it has that human quality found in all his productions. Millie Martin is made a real character at all times. Exquisite photography and lighting effects add to its beauty and accomplished comedians fall not far behind Mabel Normand in evoking laughter. This picture is said to be one of Bill Hart's best photoplays, which in the parlance of the day may be said to be "going some."

#### "IN THE DAY'S NEWS"

Dr. Lyman Abbott, who enters upon his eighty-fifth year today, has been famed as a clergyman, author, and editor for upwards of half a century, and is still numbered among the active workers. Dr. Abbott is a native of Massachusetts and comes of a New England family which has contributed to American literature through several generations. After completing his studies at New York University, in 1853, he took up law, but soon abandoned that profession to enter the Congregational ministry. His first pastorate was in Terre Haute, Ind., where he remained from 1860 to 1865. In the latter year he went to New York and in 1869 he succeeded Henry Ward Beecher as pastor of Plymouth Church in Brooklyn. During the decade that he occupied the Plymouth Church pulpit Dr. Abbott became widely famed as a preacher. In later years he has added to his reputation by his work as an author and an editor-in-chief of one of the prominent magazines.
