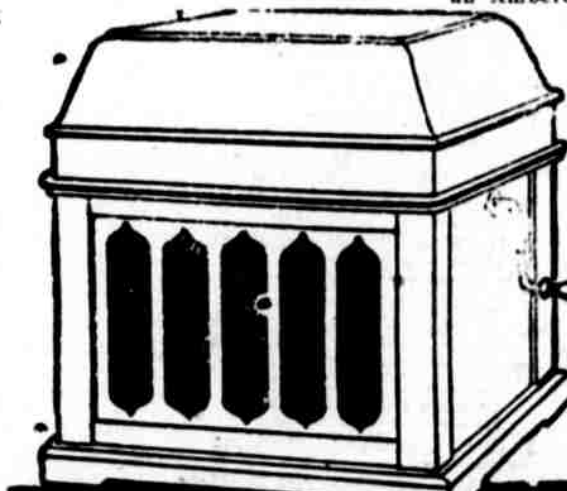

**Anarchists Turned Loose**

Of 697 alien anarchists and kindred malcontents, plotters against the government, sent to New York in recent months for deportation, only 55 (Ole Hanson, late mayor of Seattle, declares only 39) were deported.

All the rest, after brief detention at Ellis Island, where they were treated with marked consideration and allowed to receive I. W. W. literature, were turned loose to resume their seditious activities.

Frederick C. Howe, late immigration commissioner, according to astounding disclosures, uniformly showed a sympathetic attitude toward these offenders and befriended them up to the time of his resignation to take up the espousal of the Plumb plan for railroad control. He asserts, however, in his defense, that not one of the dangerous group was released or paroled save by official order from Washington!

A letter to Commissioner Howe from Emma Goldman, the notorious anarchist, recently released from a western prison and now to be deported, was brought to light. It reads as follows, addressed "MY DEAR FRED HOWE":—

"I hear about you a great deal, even though you are among the high mucky mucks to Americanize America. I was rather surprised to find your name there, but one of your position, I suppose, must participate in a lot of foolish things. I hope, however, that your fine spirit and your good taste will not be carried away by the cheap nationalism which is everywhere raising its sinister head in America today. I hope you and Marie are well. Please remember me very kindly to her. I leave for a two months' tour tomorrow, which will take me as far as St. Louis and back."

An investigation by the House Committee on Immigration, Representative Albert Johnson, chairman, has revealed a most reprehensible condition of affairs at Ellis Island, reflecting scandalously upon government officials, and further probing is under way.

Table cream, \$5.50; 1-2 pint whipping cream, \$7.50.
