The Christmas spirit that prevailed in Klamath Falls was a different one than has usually held sway. It was a Christian spirit as well as one of good will and merry making. 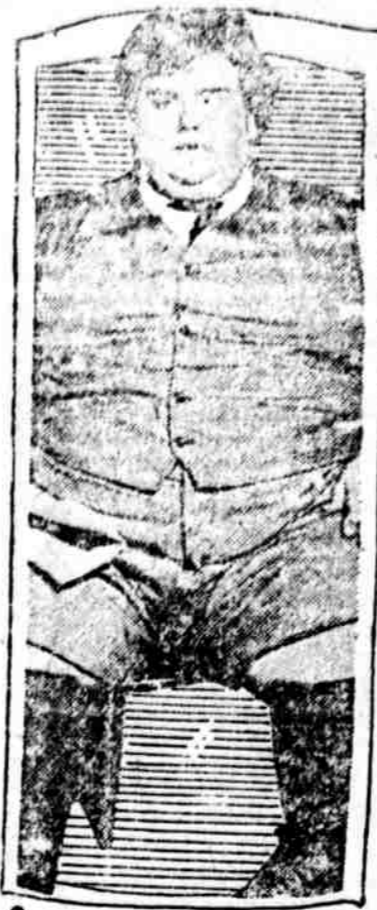
