CALIFORNIA NEWS

AUBURN, (Placer Co)—Dec. 30.—Deeds of transfer of acreage in the famous Placer county fruit belt, representing sales aggregating more than \$500,000, have been filed with County Recorder P. G. Ekberg during the past sixty days.

YREKA, December 30.—Leroy C. Ostrander, a telegraph operator at Montague, has brought suit in the Superior Court here for the annulment of his marriage to Edna Akard, nee Bryant, whom he married on November 23, 1917, on the ground that her first husband is alive and that she never has been divorced from him.

MARYSVILLE, Dec. 30.—Harold Simms, the tailor of the two alleged hold-up men held in the Yuba county jail for the murder of William Mitchell, Marysville shoeblack, is the person who inflicted the fatal pistol shot. This is according to the dying statement of Mitchell, made to Sheriff C. J. McCoy and District Attorney Fay Maxwell.

SEISSON, Dec. 30.—Marshal Schneider traveled approximately forty miles in search of a wagon and team belonging to Ben Howe, local expressman, reported stolen from in front of the Southern Pacific depot. On his return he learned that the team had been located on the school grounds, a block from the station.

COLUSA, Dec. 30.—A. Janders, an employe of the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph Company here, sustained several broken ribs and possible internal injuries that may prove serious as a result of a collision due to fog here.

REDDING, Dec. 30.—The Balakala Copper company of Coram has brought suit in the United States Court in San Francisco to recover from Shasta county a tax of \$5,092 paid under protest in December.

BAKER, Dec. 30.—Baker mer-

chants will hereafter observe all holidays uniformly as a result of a schedule adopted by the Commercial club. Stores will close all day New Year's, Thanksgiving, Memorial Day and Christmas; half holidays will be observed on the Fourth of July and Armistice day.

ORLAND, Dec. 30.—H. M. Jerome, San Francisco real estate operator and manager of the local hog ranch owned by the late S. D. Burr, was found dead in a wagon on a road west of this city Friday night.

AUBURN, Dec. 30.—Twenty-four cases of an intoxicating Japanese liquor, known as "saki" are held in the possession of Sheriff Elmer H. Gum, all as a result of a motor truck going over an embankment near Newcastle. No claimants for the liquor have appeared. Gum said Federal agents had been notified and were expected to come here for an investigation.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 30.—California, according to Ben Blow, Manager of the Good Roads Bureau of the California State Automobile Association, greets the new year with \$70,000,000 available for good roads.

Eleven counties have voted bonds since May, in addition to the state \$40,000,000 good roads bond issue and \$400,000, voted in Modoc County for the establishment of engineering grades, bridges and culverts.

BENECIA, Dec. 30.—That he had received notification from the war department that the sum of \$45,000 was to be immediately available for the construction of six miles of roads in the Benecia Arsenal grounds is the statement of Col. E. P. O'Hern here. O'Hern is Commandant of the Arsenal.

LODI, Dec. 30.—The city of Lodi has secured a petrified pine log from the foothills. The log has been placed in the Municipal Park.

It is a perfect specimen and weighs 3,785 pounds.

SACRAMENTO, Dec. 30.—Secretary of State Frank C. Jordan today indicated he will take no further action in pressing his campaign to import Chinese coolies in an effort to relieve the farm labor shortage.

EUREKA, Dec. 30.—The trials of the eight alleged I. W. W. held here on charges of criminal syndicalism, have been set by Judge George Murray for January 19th, 21st, and 26th.

COLUSA, Dec. 30.—The Pacific Rice Grower's Association will build a warehouse here because of the inadequate facilities of the public warehouses.

The association will also build warehouses in the nearby counties.

ALTURAS, Dec. 30.—Mrs. Olive Peck, who is charged with the murder of her husband, Frank Peck, in their home at Eagleville on October 30th, last, has been taken into custody. Mrs. Peck now is held in the Modoc County jail.

ALTURAS, Dec. 30.—The Supervisors have completed details for the sale of \$400,000 worth of county highway bonds to the Anglo-California Bank of San Francisco. The bank has agreed to purchase the entire issue at par and accrued interest to date of delivery, and also agrees to sell the county, in such amounts as the county may desire. United States Victory Loan Bonds drawing 4 1/2 per cent interest at par and accrued interest for any of the money that is not needed for the immediate necessities of the county.

Whenever the county needs the money for road purposes, the bank agrees to purchase back the Victory Bonds for that amount at par and accrued interest. If the bonds are worth more than par when the county desires to sell, the county is permitted to sell them in the open market.
