**VALUABLE WORK**  
BY O. A. C. PROFESSOR

"Oregon" is the title of a historical volume by John B. Horner, A. M. Litt. D., head of the department of historical research of the Oregon Agricultural college, dealing with Oregon history, literature and the men who have helped in the making of the state since the earliest days of discovery. The book is dedicated to the "Heroes and Heroines of Oregon," past and present, and contains a detailed mass of valuable information, obviously gathered by wide and painstaking research, which should make it valuable to every student of the state's history.

The author, having been a resident of the state for half a century, and with a gift for historical research and analysis, is peculiarly fitted for the task of writing a historical work of this sort. In compiling the volume he had the collaboration of a number of pioneer citizens, members of the Oregon Historical society, among others Capt. O. C. Applegate of this city, whose name is mentioned several times in connection with suggestions and data in regard to this section of the state.

The book covers the historical development of the state thoroughly, dealing with the subject in five epochs, beginning with the earliest exploration of the American continent, and following in clear, flowing narrative through the eras of occupation, territorial and state establishment, down to our own period.

The writer avoids the usual "dry" vein of the historian and presents the unfolding picture of development, step by step in a vivid style worthy of the picturesque romance of the subject. Considerable space is devoted to men and women of letters and the best examples of their poetry and prose occupy a number of pages.

Eventually without doubt, Professor Horner's book will be accepted as a text book on state history. Every home and school library in the state should contain a copy of a work so full of patriotic incentive for the future through its clear delineation of the great achievements of the past.
