PENDLETON, Dec. 31.—Five gallons of prune whiskey, eight gallons of fermenting prunes and a small copper still were captured by local police Monday night Thomas McGinnis, alleged owner of the still, was arrested and he and the outfit are held for federal authorities. McGinnis has been here two months and had a bank account showing \$2200.

Teachers in Pendleton schools were voted \$100 more for this year than their contracts called for, when the school board met Monday night. No grade teacher will receive under \$1000 and no high school teacher under \$1150.

SALEM, Dec. 31.—Salem automobile dealers organized at a meeting held here Tuesday night and plans are being made for a show to be given by the organization on February 19, 20, and 21.

ENGENE Dec. 31.—Henry O. Parker, alleged deserter from the army, was arrested at Cushman last Sunday by Deputy Sheriff George F. Croner and will be taken to Vancouver barracks.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Dec. 31.—To form fair circuits in Oregon, correlate premium lists, control concessions, and use the county fair as a means of building up toward the bigger fairs later in the fall are objects of the conference of county fair secretaries to be held at the college Friday, January 2, in connection with Farmer's week.

SALEM, Dec. 31.—The Standard Oil Company of California today paid to the secretary of state \$19,529.87, covering the sales of 1,831,410 gallons of gasoline and 263,154 gallons of distillate in November.

The total tax paid by the several motor vehicle fuel dealers operating in Oregon in November aggregated \$29,117.06. The November sales were the lightest since last March, when the total tax amounted to \$20,000.33.

PORTLAND, Dec. 31.—Erection of a modern fish smoking and packing establishment in Portland was made known yesterday.

VALE, Dec. 31.—Malheur county road bonds to the amount of \$100,000 were sold December 22 at the courthouse in Vale to Ralph H. Schneeloch company of Portland at a premium of \$3919.

EUGENE, Dec. 31.—Approximately a million and a half pounds of apples have been ground up into cider or dried at the plant of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association this fall and winter, according to J. O. Holt, manager of the association.

ASTORIA, Dec. 31.—Clatsop post, American Legion, has decided to request the Oregon legislature at its coming special session to enact a law requiring all foreign language papers to be printed in bilingual style.

ASHLAND, Dec. 31.—A chinook wind, which has been blowing steadily for a week, has licked up the snow from the Pacific highway over the Siskiyou and automobiles are going through to California. Considerable mud is encountered in some of the newly-made fills.

EUGENE, Dec. 31.—The Eugene Chamber of Commerce last night went on record as opposing two state game commissions, one for the commercial fisher and the other for the sportsmen.

SALEM, Dec. 31.—In an opinion written by Justice Harris the Oregon supreme court today reversed the verdict of the circuit court of Grant county in the case of Frederick Rader, convicted of manslaughter in killing E. E. McCue, on February 20, 1918. The case was remanded back to the lower court for retrial.

W. side of the armistice day outrage at Centralia, November 11. The pamphlet concludes with an urgent request for funds to assist in the defense of the 10 alleged I. W. W. now in jail awaiting trial for the murder of Lieutenant Warren Grimm and his fellow soldiers.

PORTLAND, Dec. 31.—G. Muri Gorden, who sprang into the local limelight by an announced flight around the world planned from San Francisco and as the inventor of a supposedly indestructible spark-plug gave himself up when he learned that he had been indicted by the Multnomah county grand jury.
