OREGON BREVITIES

SALEM, Jan. 2.—If the lumbermill operators of the Pacific northwest are able to furnish evidence of specific instances where cars are not being supplied relief will be forthcoming...

PORTLAND, Jan. 2.—Passenger cars or trucks or both are made in 32 states. Building them engages 1,101,402 persons. This does not include accessory manufacture...

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Extreme measures are being taken in Petrograd to meet the fuel famine. Advises to the State Department said wood-houses in the city were being razed...

BEND, Jan. 2.—Aside from city and district levies, Deschutes county taxes based on the 1919 assessments, which will be collectable in 1920, will total \$156,098. This represents an advance of nearly \$22,000 over the advertised budget...

MEDFORD, Jan. 2.—According to the straw ballot on the peace treaty conducted by the Medford Mail Tribune, the people of Jackson county so far by a vote of over two to one

are in favor of immediate ratification without material change. The vote came in voluntarily from every section of the county, each ballot signed with the voter's name. Friday night the vote stood as follows: For ratification with out change, 102.

For ratification with minor changes, 59.

For the Lodge amendments, 33.

OREGON CITY, Jan. 2.—Clackamas county taxpayers at the annual budget meeting, adopted by a vote of 40 to 26 a resolution urging the legislature to make increases in the salaries of the county judge and county commissioners.

EUGENE, Jan. 2.—The First National bank of Springfield and its president, Charles L. Scott are defendants in a suit just filed in federal court by S. V. Corley, former publisher of the Springfield News, for \$25,000 alleged damages.

PORTLAND, Jan. 2.—There was an advance of 60 cents a barrel in prices of hard wheat flour on Monday morning. The six family patents are quoted in carlots at mills at \$12.35 a barrel. The rise was occasioned by the high premiums that are now being paid for wheat.

SALEM, Jan. 2.—Newton Van Dalsem, in charge of vocational training in the public schools of Oregon, says it is apparent that many school officials are not aware of the opportunity to receive federal and state funds for the teaching of agriculture.

SALEM, Jan. 2.—The objective of the great majority of women at present employed in the various industries of Oregon is to earn a living rather than contribute to the support of dependents, according to a statement issued by C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner.

In 29 plants there are employed 2328 women, together with 31 children who operate under permits issued by the state labor department. Of the total number of women on the payrolls of these concerns 396 support 168 dependents, of whom 239 are children and 179 are adults.

PORTLAND, Jan. 2.—Prineville is on the verge of a building era, according to A. M. Standish, designing engineer of The Dalles, Or., who was a visitor in Portland last week after having spent some time in Prineville.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—The Western Forest and Conservation association, C. S. Chapman, secretary, has requested Senators Chamberlain and McNary to support a special appropriation of \$60,000 for the forest service next year to co-operate with the war department in airplane forest patrol.

APPEALS FROM MURDER SENTENCE

BAKERSFIELD, Calif., January. The 102nd appeal of Roy Wolfe, age 17, convicted of the murder of Elmer K. Greer, Taft rent car driver, will be heard before the state supreme court January 12, according to advices reaching District Attorney Jesse R. Dorsey.

Wolfe appealed from the judgment and order of Superior Judge Howard A. Peairs denying him a new trial. Greer was killed last May by a passenger who rode in the rear seat of his automobile. Greer's skull was fractured with a four pound hammer. Roy Wolfe was arrested two weeks after the crime at his home at Yakima, Wash. He has been employed in the Maricopa oil fields near Taft.
