**STOCKTON, Jan. 6.**—Sheriff McCoy of Yuba County has arrived in Stockton with pictures of Chester Clark, alias Lee Hartman, alias Harold Sims, and Tom Sims, arrested in Marysville for the killing of William Mitchell of that city.

**WILLOWS, Jan. 6.**—Hog cholera is making great inroads into the hog herds in the river sections in this vicinity.

**LODI, Jan. 6.**—At a meeting next Wednesday night a branch of the California Oriental Exclusion League will be formed here. The meeting will be under the auspices of the Lodi Post of the American Legion.

**TRUCKEE, Jan. 6.**—The fire that destroyed the home of W. A. Cassidy here also destroyed the plant and equipment of the Truckee Republican, published by Cassidy. The loss is placed at about \$8,000 with \$200 insurance. The origin of the fire is undetermined.

**PASADENA, Jan. 6.**—James F. Armour, a realty dealer, today shot and killed his 14-year-old son, James Cochrane Armour, while the latter lay in bed on a sleeping porch at the Armour home in one of the best residence districts here. Then the father shot and killed himself.

**SACRAMENTO, Jan. 6.**—Corporation filings in the Secretary of State's office in 1919 exceeded all records, Secretary Frank C. Jordan said today.

During the year 2,721 corporations filed articles as compared with 1,778 corporations formed in 1918. The total capital stock of the 1919 corporations was \$625,142,846.

**SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 6.**—Four consignors of the archdiocese of San Francisco were invested with the insignia of the office of domestic prelate, to which they recently were raised by Pope Benedict XV at an impressive ceremony in St. Mary's cathedral here.

**SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 6.**—W. Powers, alias W. D. Wright, alias T. B. Jones, was fined \$600 by Federal Judge William C. Van Fleet following his plea of guilty to having entered into a conspiracy to ship 250 cases of whisky to Seattle in violation of the War-Time Prohibition.

**LOS ANGELES, Jan. 6.**—The Los Angeles Times distributed a bonus totaling approximately \$60,000 to nearly 500 employees.

### CALIFORNIA NEWS

**SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 6.**—The shell of the Oregon building, relic of the 1915 P. P. I. Exposition and home of "Casey" welfare work during the war, may soon be sold at auction.

Although it had been hoped that the building could be patched up for service as a recreation headquarters for Presidio enlisted men, the structure has been pronounced too old to justify the expense of repair by Brigadier-General Blatchford, commandant at the Presidio.

**STOCKTON, Jan. 6.**—The salaries of all city employees except the Mayor and commissioners, are to be increased, the city council having adopted resolutions to that end.

**YREKA, Jan. 6.**—The Thomas Bishop Company of San Francisco, who filed suit against the McCloud River Lumber company on February 21, 1910, seeking to enjoin the lumber company and its agents from diverting the waters of Elk Creek from the lands of plaintiff, has had the trial of the case set for March 8th, next.
