### ALASKA SCHOOLS ARE EXCELLENT

CORDOVA, Alaska, Dec. 19 (By Mail)—Schools in Alaska, with few exceptions, are in excellent condition and the educational outlook in the territory is exceedingly bright, according to L. D. Henderson, superintendent of the Alaska schools, who recently returned to Juneau from a trip through the territory. Alaskans seem to be united, he said, in making the schools as effective as possible.

While in Fairbanks, Mr. Henderson visited the site of the Alaska Agricultural College and School of Mines. Well-situated, carefully planned structure," he said. "I hope that in the near future a flourishing school will be in operation."

"Business conditions in the interior and to the westward, while still suffering to some extent from the depressing effects of the war, are by no means discouraging," he said. "Many communities, while temporarily somewhat depleted in population, still display evidence that they have solid backing."

## ONLY TEN AND HALF TONS OF WHITE GEMS

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—If all the diamonds mined in history and existing today as cut and polished gems were gathered from the ends of the earth, they would form a pile about as large as a wagon load of coal dumped on the sidewalk, says a Chicago statistical expert. The pile would contain 46,355,474 carats and the gems would weigh 10 1/2 tons. If the pile were in the form of a cone, it would have a base diameter of eight feet and a height of five feet. Reckoning the diamonds at \$300 a carat, it would have a value of \$13,906,342,200. It would contain 716 1/2 gallons worth \$5,539,023 a gallon; or 76 1/3 bushels valued at \$31,570,729 a bushel. All the world's diamonds could be packed in an ordinary clothes closet or a kitchen pantry.

This estimate is based on an approximation of the total output of rough diamonds in the world's entire history. India, it is estimated, has produced, all told, 50,000,000 carats; Brazil 15,000,000; South Africa 170,574,000; Borneo, 1,000,000; British Guiana 50,000; Australia 150,000; China 2,000; Siberia 500; United States 500. This is a total rough output of 233,777,374 carats or 55 3/5 tons avoirdupois.

Only about 50 percent of rough diamonds are cut into gems and lose about 60 percent of their weight in being cut and polished. Diamonds are practically indestructible and the first diamond ever mined may possibly still be in existence. But the estimate allows for the loss of at least 1,000,000 carats by flood, fire, shipwreck and other disasters. These reductions and losses leave a total of cut and polished diamonds at 46,355,474 carats.

The estimate of \$300 a carat is the minimum price at which diamonds can be bought today. The popular demand for diamonds was never so great and they have become the gem of working people as well as the wealthy classes. They are worth three times as much now as before the war and sell at from \$300 to \$1,000 a carat.

#### BIG CERRY SHIPMENT

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 7.—Cerry shipments from the lower Sacramento river country are averaging fifteen carloads a day, the largest in the history of this section. More than 400 carloads have been shipped east thus far this season.
